I just wanted to thank the Board and ADOT 17 staff, specifically the aeronautics group for the continued 18 support of the airport system and the Aviation Fund. 19 Obviously, especially right now, with the current 2.0 pandemic, airports are playing a significant role connecting 21 both, you know, critical cargo need throughout Sky Harbor and 22 Tucson. I've seen a very large uptick in critical medical 23 supplies, as well as many general aviation airports are helping

out by flying physicians around to some of the rural general

aviation airports that have some -- have -- don't have enough

1 physicians at hand. 2 So I know everyone's going to be working very 3 hard, redoing revenue projects and budgets and updating the 4 Aviation Fund over the next few months, but I just wanted to, 5 you know, appreciate the Board and its staff's support over the 6 last few years. We were finally able to get the state/local 7 program up -- back up and running on the Aviation Fund this last I know it's going to be a tough -- tough revenue 8 9 projection year, but we're hoping that we can continue with the 10 state/local program and continue to support the airports like 11 you have been. So I just wanted to thank you. Thank you, the 12 Board, for everything you do and the aeronautics staff at ADOT. 13 MR. ROEHRICH: Thank you, Mr. Smejkal. 14 The next person is Mr. Tim Suan, Community 15 Development Director, City of Page. 16 Mr. Suan, are you on the phone? And I saw him. 17 MR. DIRECTOR HALIKOWSKI: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Good morning. Apologies for all the technical glitches, but as we boomers get used to actually working in a different fashion, Floyd and I are learning a lot about what works and what doesn't work.

So going right into this issue of the Director's report, first of all, I want to assure everybody that ADOT is open and operational. I think as you've seen, we've been doing a lot during the crisis to ensure that we are keeping things moving and getting everybody safely home. We've opened up two additional rest areas that were previously closed for truck parking and to provide sanitary facilities there.

The Motor Vehicle Division is operating by appointments, and we're hitting somewhere up to about 90 percent of internet transactions, which is a new record.

The Governor recently did an executive order to allow food trucks to operate in the rest areas, and we're getting some initial permits in on that. We're allowing divisible loads up to 90,000 pounds, which is up from 80, to allow trucks to haul more essential supplies. And we've donated respirator masks that we had previously bought for the H1N1 flu breakout and had on hand still to the Arizona Veterans Home and to the Pioneer Home.

So I'd like to just thank our ADOT staff for rising to this unprecedented challenge. I think this has been

just an incredible shock to everyone's way of life, and our employees are continuing to perform their duty and making sure that everyone is getting safely home. We are practicing safe guidelines. If you're hearing anything to the contrary, as you can see, this is a roomful of masked bandits I have with me here. And also, we're instituting safe guidelines in all of our offices and as much as we can with our maintenance crews. You've seen a lot of executive orders coming out and media releases, you know, and ADOT is continuing to try to find additional ways to ease the burden of this crisis on the general public.

So during this time of great change, what we're going to do today is Katie Proctor, who's our director of government relations and administrative rules, is going to talk a little bit about what's going on on the legislative front, both in the state and what we know of federal. As you heard, these are very uncertain times. So coupled with her presentation on what we're seeing happening with the transportation issues at those government levels, we're going to have Kristine Ward also talk about the finances and what's happening there.

I will say that I think it was last week's

Finance Advisory Committee, Kristine came back, and one of our

most eminent economic experts looked up at the committee, the

Finance Advisory Committee when asked, you know, what he was

predicting, and he said, "Honestly, I just don't know."

So we are in a very difficult world right now

trying to track trends and spot what's happening with revenues,

and Kristine will talk about those more as we look then to

recast the five-year program in light of the COVID-19 crisis.

So I'm going to stop there and turn it over to Katie with your permission, Mr. Chairman, and let Katie talk about what's happening at the Legislature and also at the federal level.

So Katie, you're on.

First, for the State. The State Legislature passed a baseline or a skinny budget over the last several days in March, ultimately finishing on March 23rd, and then recessing. Originally, they thought they would return on April 13th, this Monday. However, subsequently, the Governor's executive order encouraging folks to stay home was issued, and the Legislature chose not to come back this week.

Today would be the 96th day of session. Out of 1,605 original introduced bills, to date only 58 have been passed and signed by the Governor. You previously have received briefings including 29 transportation project and funding bills that were moving through the process. As of today, none of those bills have passed. Last week, as the Director mentioned, the Finance Advisory Committee and JLBC held a briefing

outlining the expected budget shortfall for the next fiscal year. With the current economic uncertainty, there is no set date right now to return for the Legislature or any plan yet on how they will proceed when they do.

For the federal update, late last month Congress passed the CARES Act providing the \$2 trillion stimulus package to offset some of the effects of COVID-19. Since then we've heard discussion of including a massive infrastructure package as part of the next coronavirus package. However, it appears that the priority has shifted to small business assistance and unemployment benefits.

It is believed that the next infrastructure funding will be addressed in the coming months but may not be in the context of an immediate coronavirus package. Right now the focus in D.C. is on the small business rescue fund, which as many of you know ran out of its funding capacity yesterday. And we have to wait until next week for any movement on Capitol Hill related to that. The Senate is scheduled to reconvene for a pro forma session on Monday, April 20th; however, the House is not scheduled to come back until May 4th. And that's my report.

DIRECTOR HALIKOWSKI: So Mr. Chairman, I would just add to that that we're continuing to work with the Governor's staff to look at ways we can ease the financial burdens on the State, and that means whether there are policy changes USDOT could make or other ways that the federal

government could perhaps relax some of the silos that they put transportation funding into. So the efforts on the federal level are ongoing.

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I would just add that although the Legislature passed the skinny budget, given the fact of what we're facing financially and economically, I'm concerned they're going to come back and probably pass what I'll call the anorexic budget next, because I think that we're all going to be looking at some severe measures to ensure that we have the funds necessary to keep the system open and operational and to keep ADOT operations going at a level to meet that challenge.

So that concludes my report, Mr. Chairman. The next pieces, I think, on the agenda you'll hear from the state engineer and our chief financial officer, Kristine Ward.

CHAIRMAN HAMMOND: Thank you, John, or Director.

Is there any board member that would like to ask the Director a question? We will ask Audra to get on, but is there any board member?

Okay. Go ahead.

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through March. So this chart will not have captured the
experience that -- of COVID and the stay-at-home orders that we
have been living under.

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So as of -- through March, we were a little bit below forecast, .9 percent, with about 1.2 billion in revenues received year to date.

Gas tax, and I'm -- I'm going to give you a little bit more detail hear, because I think it will serve as quite the contrast as we go forward in the coming months. Gas tax is about 3.6 above last year and about 2.7 percent above what our forecast was. Diesel also above last year by 2.1 percent. A little below forecast.

So moving on to the Regional Area Road Fund. If you could advance the slide.

It's important that you know that what is reflected here is Regional Area Road Fund revenues through February. So we're always a month behind our HURF revenues. Our HURF revenues were from March. These RARF revenue numbers are from February. As of February's numbers, we were above forecast to the tune of 2.2 percent, with February actuals 10.5 percent above the same period last year. Year to date, we've received about \$333 million in revenues flowing into RARF at 8.3 percent growth year to date.

So if we could move on to the next slide.

So the federal aid program, Katie spoke to you a

bit about that. We -- what we have been doing over the last three to four weeks is trying to come up with some estimates in what has been -- revenue estimates in what has become the word of the year, "unprecedented." I quite honestly am quite tired of this word, because there is no good basis for the forecasts -- the forecasting situation.

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In terms of the federal aid program, I'm going to touch on that for a moment. I am not revising the numbers on the federal aid program at this point. It is assumed that we will continue with the same federal formula -- level of federal formula funding that we built into the tentative program that was provided to -- presented to the Board. However, it should be noted, as I go into the next few slides and talk to you about the impact to our -- what we are estimating our HURF revenues to be, and thus our State Highway Fund revenues, it's important to understand that the Highway Trust Fund, which was forecasted to be in a deficit position as of the end of this year, is reliant on the same revenue sources that the Highway User Revenue Fund, our revenue, our fund is built on, and that is fuel taxes as well as -- fuel taxes, largely.

In the Highway Trust Fund, 95 percent -- at the Federal Highway Trust Fund, 95 percent of the revenues flowing into that fund are from fuel taxes. So it will be -- you can anticipate that the deficit position that we were -- that was a known issue will be accelerated as we deal with the people

staying at home and driving less.

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If we could on go into the next slide, I think

I'll cover that -- these items in the next slide.

So like I said, over the last few weeks, we have been trying to develop revenue estimates and financial impacts associated with COVID, and we are trying to base those on some logical and historical perspective which we do not have. The bottom line here is we do not know what the COVID revenue impacts will be. We started off with thinking, okay, well, let's look at the Great Recession, but this -- the Great Recession does not serve as a comparable model, because it was -- it was not the immediate shock to the system of people staying at home. We eased into the -- comparatively speaking, we eased into the Great Recession compared to the COVID situation.

Given that we have no historical perspective to drive this, what we have chosen to do is only recast the program for these first few years, FY '20 through FY '22, leaving the remaining years of the program unforecast at this point, because it's difficult enough to just try and forecast the unknown for a couple of years, let alone, say, '20 through -- FY '20 through '25.

So what the numbers I'm going to be -- that I'm presenting you basically are just for the period of FY '20 through FY '22. We will revisit these numbers. Well, quite

honestly, we're watching numbers daily, but we will firmly revisit these numbers in the next two months, and as Floyd mentioned to you earlier, you know, the next steps of this will be to recast the tentative program based on these current numbers knowing that this is a fluid situation. So as I said, these forecasts are extremely speculative, and we are seeing information changing weekly.

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To give you some perspective on that, I think it was last week we were -- when we were three -- we had three weeks of unemployment claims that put us at about 17 million.

This fourth week, we are now up to 22 million unemployment claims. That implies an unemployment rate of approximately 17 percent. In my world, that's goose bump material. This is just a shocking time.

The approach we've taken in these -- towards these estimates and the approach we will need to take as we recast the program is to preserve cash. When you are in a situation in which you have no way of forecasting what is to come, the approach is to preserve your most liquid and flexible fund source. So we are looking to preserve cash so we can not only respond to the situations that are dealt to us, but deal with matching our federal funds and so forth.

Our best estimate, you can see here on the screen, which best estimate, also known as "guess", for our HURF revenues is in '20 -- in FY '20, the current year, with only

these few remaining months, we are forecasting a 9 percent decline in revenues. In FY '21, a 22 percent decline in revenues, and in FY '22, a 12 percent decline.

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The way we've approached this is we have significantly diminished our forecasts for gas tax -- fuel tax revenues, particularly gas tax in these first few months, starting to see -- coming out of those significant declines in the November time -- the October/November time frame.

VLT, similar situation. We are estimating more declines in the initial months and then starting to see minor bits of recovery in the months November forward.

 $\label{eq:special} \mbox{If we can move to the next slide. Oh, no, no.}$ $\mbox{Excuse me, Floyd.}$

So what this means in terms of dollars, these revised estimates, the impact to the State Highway Fund, our estimated impact to the State Highway Fund is diminished revenues available to the tune of \$385 million. However, the State Highway -- by the -- given the diminished forecasts for the State Highway Fund, this impacts our bond program.

So if we could proceed to the next slide.

The municipal -- subsequent to this slide being developed, the municipal bond market has settled some. However, there has been very, very limited demand for bonds. In the last four weeks, we have watched investors sell off and convert to cash. Every -- people are focused on having cash in hand, and

they are -- as such, they are -- there's very, very limited demand for bonds on the market. To put this into perspective, last week alone, there was 2.3 billion flowing out of the bond market. Typically, we would see a -- moneys coming into the market, 6 to 8 billion -- this -- so this is a highly unusual situation. Last week we saw our first inflows into the market. Demands -- I'm sorry -- demands for dollars, and that only totaled \$833 million. That is a very small number when you are talking about the overall municipal bond market.

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In light of the situation that we have declining State Highway Fund dollars available, declining revenues there, and keep in mind that those State Highway Fund dollars serve to pay our debt service, they serve as the -- as what we leverage -- the revenue source we leverage against in order to purchase bonds. So in light of those declining revenues, in light of higher costs of capital, because there are -- there's less demand for bonds, many issuers like ADOT are choosing to defer planned bond issues. So in addition to the declining revenues, the number I just communicated to you, \$355 million, in addition, we are deferring planned bond issues to the tune of \$155 million.

The combined impact of this is -- my goodness. I can't see my own screen -- is a \$540 million impact to the tentative five-year program. Our next steps in this -- or first, our continual analysis -- continued analysis of the data

Kristine, can we talk about the stock market and the financial situation and, you know, essentially the drop in driving, oil prices, et cetera?

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MS. WARD: Yes, Mr. Chair and Mr. Elters.

So with regards to -- I believe you are referring to the last page of the financial report, the investment performance that is provided through February 29th in the board report, where you will see that interest received to date on all of the funds is about \$19.4 million. The State Highway Fund year to date has received approximately \$3.5 million in interest earnings. \$3.5 million is a very small amount compared to the vastness of what we are experiencing in revenue declines. However, those moneys do, indeed, flow back into the State Highway Fund, and we actually build those revenue estimates into the overall estimates of State Highway Fund -- HURF and State Highway Fund revenues.

I would say that with regards to the volatility that the Director is talking about with regards to the markets and so forth, in the case of the State Highway Fund, as well as all of our funds, and if you look on that report, you will see that each -- we have all of our funds divided into investment pools. Those pools are dictated to us, and in law as to what we are able to invest the various funds in, the various moneys in. And those investments are very -- they're largely fixed income in nature. So they are very low risk investments, per law. We

-- and so they sit with the treasurer, and the treasurer has to follow the guidelines as defined in law as to what these items -- these funds can be invested in.

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So unfortunately, we're dealing with very low investment earnings, as you can see, 3.5 million compared to the \$540 million issue that we're facing, and we are limited in what we can do with those investments. I hope that answers your question, sir.

DIRECTOR HALIKOWSKI: Well, I think the second part was -- I'm sorry to interrupt -- the then impacts on projects that are either in process or scheduled in the program.

MS. WARD: Director Halikowski, overall, we are going to need to take and go -- Greg's team is going to, as I mentioned, going to provide Greg the overall numbers for -- the overall revised numbers, and it's going to mean going back and sitting down and figuring out how we can rebalance this tentative program to come back into fiscal constraint given that we are losing -- estimated to lose \$540 million out of this program. Does that address your question, sir?

DIRECTOR HALIKOWSKI: I think so. So Mr. Elters, what we're seeing just in a very basic sense is gasoline sales, which you know we collect 18 cents tax, roughly, for the State and 18 cents for the feds, have literally just dropped, and we're not really seeing the revenues come in. New car sales, just as they did during the Great Recession in 2009, from which

we derive VLT, again, have precipitously dropped.

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So those two main factors that drive our state revenues are causing us to seriously have to reforecast the program, and I would say that it's very difficult to give definitive answers today since, as Kristine will tell you, we have very little data from a trend perspective to track on revenues. And so what we're planning to do is we need to do some more analysis and come back and meet with the Board in a future study session to discuss what the impacts of this are going to be on projects that are either within the program or future projects that were considered. Is that fair?

MS. WARD: Yes, sir.

DIRECTOR HALIKOWSKI: Thank you.

MS. WARD: Dallas, just --

MR. ELTERS: Mr. Chairman, Director Halikowski, Ms. Ward, thank you for the insight. That goes a long way to answering the question, and I can only imagine what it's like (indiscernible), and I sympathize.

I wanted to do one quick follow-up, if I may, because (indiscernible) discussed the preserving match needs and the (indiscernible) along that front. I guess this question may be similar to the question I asked previously, and I understand that you're doing a lot of analysis as we speak. You may not have all the answers. But I guess my question, as we preserve cash, what does that mean to the projects that are currently in

the hopper, either in the project development phase or in the project construction phase?

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MS. WARD: Mr. Hammond, Mr. Elters -- Mr. Elters, nothing is off the table. We have to consider the projects that are underway as well as the projects that are planned. And of course, we will -- Greg's team and Dallas' team will approach this, and we will look to ensure that we are not making illogical decisions based on depending where a project is in its life cycle. But the bottom line here is we can't afford to -- or let me reverse that. We have to look at everything that we are spending dollars on and evaluate how to proceed given these revenue declines.

DIRECTOR HALIKOWSKI: So to your point, though,
Mr. Elters, as Kristine and I have talked, cash and liquidity is
just critical at this time, and so a lot of the efforts we're
taking are to increase cash, because we have to have that on
hand to meet our federal match in order to get the drawdown.
Unless we can get the feds to change the rules quickly on a
number of fronts, those matches, whether they're for the federal
drawdown at 5.7 percent or higher, given a BUILD or INFRA grant
where it may run 20 percent or more, cash has become a critical
factor in our ability to keep the system running for the time
being. Again, that -- fair?

MS. WARD: That is a fair point, sir.

DIRECTOR HALIKOWSKI: So I quess Chairman,

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Mr. Elters, board members, as we're looking out over the next
few weeks, some of the projects that we have -- and Dallas and
Kristine can speak better to this -- but some of them are
dependent on federal grants and meeting the matches for those
grants.

The other thing is, is I just want to caution you
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again from a state perspective. As you know, we enacted a public safety fee in the state last year to offset DPS Highway Patrol funding from the HURF and Highway Fund. The Legislature repealed that based on the idea that they would backfill the Highway Patrol funds with general fund dollars. My prediction is general fund dollars have now become scarce as dodo birds in the future, and that highway safety fee repeal may have a backlash of once again coming to the HURF Highway Fund to backfill DPS Highway Patrol. I don't know that's going to happen, but as I look at all the different factors out there, we have a lot of challenges that we're going to be facing to keep not only the State open, but the state highway system, also.

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So this is a pie diagram of current construction dollars for this season. This is based on contract bid amounts, and so looking at the top left quadrant of the pie, awarded in January of 2020, we've had one project that was awarded for \$14.4 million, and that's the Butler/Fourth Street Bridge project, which we'll talk about later.

Awarded last month and I believe two projects from the month before, we have six projects total -- totaling the 20.8 million. Those projects are just kicking off now, the partnering meetings and precon. meetings, and so we'll see those highly active this season.

And then lastly, we have what we call our rollover projects, or rollover construction projects from last season, and these are projects that started last season, went into winter shutdown because the temperatures or snow, and then they finished the following season. So they're two-season projects. The \$55.1 million bid amount includes seven projects, and we completed about 41.7 million of that last year, and we'll be finishing the remaining approximately 9.4 million this year, and that's just under 20 percent of the 51.5.

Next slide.

In the interest of time, I've just selected a few projects today to show some photos of. I'm going to kind of

move in a counterclockwise direction. So my first slide will be up in the northwest corner of the state, with State Route 389 and Short Creek Bridge and of our I-15 projects, and then I'll move kind of south to southeast with State Route 89A, a pavement preservation project, and I-40, Little Colorado Bridges, and then kind of come back and (indiscernible) back to Flagstaff with the Fourth Street Bridge project.

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The photo on the left is the State Route 389

Short Creek Bridge project. You can see the steel

(indiscernible) in the picture that are currently exposed

(indiscernible) bridge scour retrofit project, and it was

awarded last fall. It's about a \$2 million contract, and it

will be completed this season.

The photo on the right was the I-15 bridge two, four, five, and this is actually of bridge four, which is a full deck replacement, and it has some girder repair to it. Bridges two and five are also on this project, and they just include some deck repair work, and that's a \$6.3 million contract, and they expect that to be complete this summer.

(Indiscernible) of the I-14 Little Colorado

Bridges, which is a deck joint and pier rehab project. It was

awarded last fall. It's about a \$1.2 million project, and that

will be completed this season. And then to the right, we have

the State Route 89A pavement preservation project for Oak Creek, and that's located between Flagstaff and Sedona. We've completed the pavement work on that. We're working on the guardrail, and so we'll have that completed here within the next few months, and that's an \$8.3 million project.

So this is the I-40 Fourth Street Bridge project. It is an underpass. The OP overpass -- this is a misprint on my part on the presentation. The work consists of replacing and some city widening of the existing bridges at the Fourth Street underpass. This is a photo of abutment excavation that's taking place right now on Interstate 40 at the Fourth Street Bridge location. This is the first item of work on this project, and it will be shown later in a short video. This project (indiscernible) in January. It's a \$14.4 million contract. It is shared funding between ADOT and the City of Flagstaff, and we do a fixed date end completion of this project of October 31st of this year.

Next slide.

And this is the Fourth Street Bridges from on top of the bridge structure. So you're looking to north on Fourth Street itself, and to replace these structures -- there's one over eastbound and one over westbound 40 -- we're using a construction technique called a bridge slide, and we will build part of the new structure at its permanent location on the west

side of the existing structure that you're looking at, which is the left side of the photo, and then we'll build the remaining portion of the new structure at a temporary location on the east side of this existing structure, which is the right side of the photo. And then what happens is the existing structure in the center then will be removed, and the structure on the east side will be slid to the west at its permanent location. So the bridge slide — the bridge slide construction technique allows us to construct this project in one season. That's the reason why we have the October 6th end date, and it reduces travel impacts to the public.

     five-year program that we're currently going back and taking a
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look at. As Kristine had noted earlier, because of the changes in revenue, we're having to revisit the five-year program.

We've already started looking at reprioritizing some of the projects as well as looking at all the data that we have for projects that are in the program that we can possibly move around or change to accommodate the new revenue stream that is

being projected.

The next item I have is we had the CARES Act that the federal government had passed that is having an impact on the state. It's actually a positive impact. One of the big things that we have is there's additional revenue that's coming in for our transit program. We have an additional \$35 million that's coming in for small urban transit operators across the state. That money is basically passed through. We do not administer that money.

There's an additional \$41 million that came in through the rural transit operators. That is money that ADOT does administer to each of the different transit subrecipients across the state. Of the 41 million, there was actually 6 million that will go directly to the different tribal operators. That was at their request. So they'll actually be utilizing that money and working through FTA with that. That money is in addition to the 14 million that is normally appropriated through FTA for transit for the state.

There was also some substantial funds that came

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in for the large urban areas, for the Phoenix and Mesa urban areas. They got -- they received an additional 188-plus million dollars, and for the Tucson area, they received an additional 44 -- yeah, $44 million that came through that CARES Act.
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One of the other items that we have in the CARES Act was funding through FAA. Those funds do not come through the State, but they have an effect on us in that airports that have received an FAA grant within year 2020. Those grants are normally a 10 percent match. FAA has done away with the match requirement. Where it affects us is we generally give any FAA grant that come in to the state of Arizona, we take and give those airports half of their match. We will no longer have to distribute that 5 percent of the 10 percent that each of the airports get. So they'll have those proceeds in our aeronautics fund that we won't be distributing out (indiscernible) will be taking a look as part of the five-year program.

That's all I had as my report. So if there's any questions, I'm here to certainly answer them.

CHAIRMAN HAMMOND: Thank you.

Does anybody have a question? Board member -- I thought there was somebody chime in.

     March we finalized 10 projects, totaling $23.4 million, and year
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to date, we have finalized 85 projects.

A couple of notes the Director mentioned earlier.

As we've gone through the COVID-19 virus, I want to share with the Board the Department is still working. A large number of our development staff is teleworking. That includes designers, environmental planners, right-of-way agent and utility coordinators. We have been able to continue moving forward.

They are working from home either full time or part-time, coming into the office and going back home. Those are still moving forward.

Construction projects, they are moving forward.

We have had a couple of cases where contractors or subcontractors have requested additional time due to delays, either crews being quarantined or materials weren't available on their projects, but those are very limited at this time, and we are reviewing those requests as they come up.

Our highway operation crews continue to work.

They maintain our system. They're responding to incidents on a daily basis. One of the things that we've introduced in some of our units to help with keeping those crews safe and providing social distance is having a seven-day workweek. What we do is we split our crews in half. The first crew works Sunday through Wednesday, a 4-10 shift. We have a day where they meet together on Wednesday, and then the second crew works a 4-10 shift Wednesday through Saturday. This still allows us to have enough

people to perform the work. It allows one person per vehicle to give us that social distancing and keep our folks safe. So we are still working -- maintenance is still going on.

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As Kristine mentioned, with revenues down, part of that is traffic is down. We're seeing over 30 percent of the volume on our freeways from the same week a year ago. On I-17 last week, it was 51 percent fewer vehicles than the same week last year. So again, that's going to equate to less gas being burned and revenues collected on our freeways.

On the contract side, we did have two -- we did plan on opening two bids in April. We are going to postpone those. In talking to the contractors association, there's a lot of unknowns. We could delay those and open them in May. They were not weather sensitive projects. So we were going to delay those bid openings, those two projects, and open them in May and go forward from there.

The next thing is we've talked a lot about grant opportunities. Those grant opportunities require cash. As

Kristine said, it's golden. That will -- or potentially will

limit our opportunities to apply for new grants as they come up.

We're evaluating how it's going to affect our existing grants,

but as we look at new grants coming forward, we have to take

into account we may not be able to participate if the federal

government keeps their same requirements. The Director

mentioned that we are requesting that the -- that on those

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grants that we look at ways that it could be federal only or we match with other federal funds. That may change things, but as the rules stand now, we will be limited on what we can participate in the future on grants.
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And then the last thing, Mr. Chair, last week we were tasked with a group from the department administration, the Department of Corrections, to provide face coverings for every state employee. ADOT was a part of that team. We worked with those other two agencies, and we transported and delivered over 50,000 face coverings for every state employee throughout the state. So it was a group effort between the agencies, and we were happy to do our part.

Mr. Chair, that's the end of the state engineer's report.

CHAIRMAN HAMMOND: Thank you, Dallas.

Does any board member have a question on that portion of the -- of Dallas' presentation?

DIRECTOR HALIKOWSKI: Mr. Chair, this is the

Director. I just want to also, since Dallas brought up cash

again, and I know we've talked about all the different ways

we're trying to save cash. I was wondering if Kristine or

Dallas could comment on the HURF swap program, whereby we trade

federal dollars from our smaller communities with state dollars

and what the status of that will be. Kristine?

MS. WARD: Director, that -- as I had mentioned,

everything is on the table for being considered, and I will have to say that under this situation, we are doing the exchange of giving state -- providing locals State Highway Fund dollars in exchange for federal dollars, and what we really need to have is State Highway Fund dollars available to us. So yes, we -- the HURF swap program is going to need to be evaluated and potentially suspended.

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DIRECTOR HALIKOWSKI: So Mr. Chairman, you'll recall the last time we had to suspend the HURF swap program was during the Great Recession, and it is a burden on our smaller communities, because they have to deal with federal dollars and the federal accompanying rules, and so as we venture back into the unknown of having enough cash on hand, I just wanted to give the Board a warning that that program is likely in jeopardy also for the future. We'll do the best we can to work with local governments to mitigate the burden of those federal regulations by helping them through it, but unfortunately, very often it gets to be a frustrating exercise if they're not used to working under the federal regs.

Dallas, do you have any other comment on the HURF swap?

MR. HAMMIT: No. Our local public agencies, groups will work and communicate with the MPOs, and local agencies will look at the projects in the pipeline and will provide all the assistance that we can.
