Welcome to a meeting of the Arizona State Transportation Board. The Transportation Board consists of seven private citizen members appointed by the Governor, representing specific transportation districts. Board members are appointed for terms of six years each, with terms expiring on the third Monday in January of the appropriate year.

BOARD AUTHORITY

Although the administration of the Department of Transportation is the responsibility of the director, the Transportation Board has been granted certain policy powers in addition to serving in an advisory capacity to the director. In the area of highways the Transportation Board is responsible for establishing a system of state routes. It determines which routes are accepted into the state system and which state routes are to be improved. The Board has final authority on establishing the opening, relocating, altering, vacating or abandoning any portion of a state route of a state highway. The Transportation Board awards construction contracts and monitors the status of construction projects. With respect to aeronautics the Transportation Board distributes monies appropriated to the Aeronautics Division from the State Aviation Fund for planning, design, development, land acquisition, construction and improvement of publicly-owned airport facilities. The Board also approves airport construction. The Transportation Board has the exclusive authority to issue revenue bonds for financing needed transportation improvements throughout the state. As part of the planning process the Board determines priority planning with respect to transportation facilities and annually adopts the five year construction program.

CITIZEN INPUT

Citizens may appear before the Transportation Board to be heard on any transportation-related issue. Persons wishing to protest any action taken or contemplated by the Board may appear before this open forum. The Board welcomes citizen involvement, although because of Arizona's open meeting laws, no actions may be taken on items which do not appear on the formal agenda. This does not, however, preclude discussion of other issues.

MEETINGS

The Transportation Board typically meets on the second Friday of each month. Meetings are held in locations throughout the state. In addition to the regular business meetings held each month, the Board also conducts three public hearings each year to receive input regarding the proposed five-year construction program. Meeting dates are established for the following year at the December organization meeting of the Board.

BOARD MEETING PROCEDURE

Board members receive the agenda and all backup information one week before the meeting is held. They have studied each item on the agenda and have consulted with Department of Transportation staff when necessary. If no additional facts are presented at the meeting, they often act on matters, particularly routine ones, without further discussion. In order to streamline the meetings the Board has adopted the "consent agenda" format, allowing agenda items to be voted on en masse unless discussion is requested by one of the board members or Department of Transportation staff members.

So I'd like to update the Board on where the Transportation and Trade Corridor Alliance Advisory Group is. 2 3 At your places, you all have a report that was recently 4 released by the TTCA at the Arizona Mexico Commission meeting 5 in -- here in the valley, and the report really focuses on the 6 idea of in Arizona we need to make it here and sell it there, 7 thereby generating cash that we bring into the state for goods 8 and services, and bring that wealth back to our economy to 9 create new jobs.

10 On page 7 and 8 of the report, you'll see 11 Arizona's advantage, as we've talked about with the Board 12 before that we said in a location between some pretty 13 significant markets, to the west of us, the San Diego, L.A. 14 basin, and to the east of us, the Dallas, Houston, Fort Worth 15 area. To the south we have Mexico, our number one trading 16 partner, and to the north of us, we have Canada, our number 17 two trading partner.

18 So if you turn to page 21, you'll see what we 19 have been talking about with a number of you. It's our key 20 commerce corridors initiative. And these are the trade routes 21 that we believe will connect us to these markets nearby and 22 through the ports in L.A. and San Diego, to the rest of the 23 world. So the routes are important to us, because they're 24 going to require future investment, and as you're aware, we 25 just simply don't have those funds right now.

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8 1 But the TTCA roadmap does suggest a number of 2 strategies to move Arizona forward to generate more trade and 3 future generation of wealth. So we are out there working the 4 key conference corridors issue. This report will not wind up 5 on the shelf. The TTCA is going to continue its work to 6 focus on trade and transportation, and along those lines, I 7 have a trip scheduled to Mexico City August the 5th and 6th 8 where we'll be meeting with a number of officials who 9 approached us at the recent Arizona Mexico Commission about 10 making improvements on the Mexican side of our ports of entry 11 at Douglas, Nogales and San Luis. So the work of the TTCA's 12 going to continue, and ADOT staff will be working with a 13 number of business leaders out there, as we have been, to talk 14 about the investment and the needs of transportation to move 15 our economy forward. 16 The other thing I just want to touch on very 17 briefly is the federal transportation funding issue, and 18 Kristie will be talking more about FY '14 and FY '15, but 19 briefly, just to note, seems to be two proposals moving 20 through Congress right now, one in the House and one in the 21 Senate. The one in the House will basically give us a

22 Band-Aid or a patch on the Federal Highway Trust Fund until

23 July of 2015. The one in the Senate that Senator Boxer is

24 proposing could give us a patch to December of this year. And

25 the idea is that somehow that report's (inaudible) on Congress

1 to take some real action on the Highway Trust Fund and fix it 2 for longer term.

3 Both of those bills have been through markup at this point, which means they are moving forward, but obviously 4 5 the houses will have to go to Conference Committee and iron 6 out their differences, which seem to be how those funds, that 7 \$10 billion, is going to be generated for deposit into the 8 Highway Trust Fund. So we're watching the action closely, but 9 it seems, and I don't want to get too crystal ball here, but 10 it seems that Congress is moving forward to at least give us 11 some sort of Band-Aid to get us through at least the end of 12 this year, if not into next fiscal year.

13 A couple other items I just want to update the 14 Board on is we had a freight roundtable, US Department of 15 Transportation and the Greater Phoenix Chamber of Congress --16 Greater Phoenix Chamber of Commerce hosted on brief policy 17 roundtable discussion, and Greg Nadeau, who's the acting 18 administrator for FHWA, was here in town. And I facilitated this discussion with stakeholders from Union Pacific, Arizona 19 20 Truck (inaudible) Association, the City of Phoenix, City of 21 Tucson, (inaudible) and others, and we had a very good 22 discussion about insights and experiences in what's happening 23 nationally to begin moving freight more through our region and 24 how we connect to the global markets.

State Route 189, as you know, has been a topic

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25

in front of this board on numerous times. Our director's 1 2 office staff has met with leaders in Nogales (inaudible) PAG 3 and (inaudible) County to discuss financing State Route 189. 4 As you know, the idea was what we call an HN option or a 5 Highway Project Advancement Note. And that's a mechanism in 6 state law that would allow you to use local funds, much like 7 the City of Mesa has done, to advance state transportation 8 projects.

9 The City really came back and said that this 10 option is not going to work for them because it's going to 11 overburden their budget for obligation and risk. The option 12 approaching the Resource Allocation Advisory Council, the 13 RAAC, to fund this project prior to the distribution of the 14 discretionary funds under Casa Grande (inaudible), they didn't 15 really get much farther with that, but (inaudible) and the 16 City of Nogales is going to pursue this option at the next COG 17 and NPO meeting.

So essentially what they're doing is saying,
let's take the funds for 189 off of the top before we go
through the Resource Allocation or the RAAC distribution. Not
sure where that one's going to go but (inaudible).

In fact, if memory serves me, 3 we are having three to four additional public meetings above 4 and beyond what is typical when an airport does a master plan. 5 These are typically done about every seven years, but this 6 will be ongoing for the next few months.

So an internal building is going to allow us to be in compliance with our TSA regulations and also with the Americans With Disabilities Act. It's also going to allow us to better support our commercial airline operations. It gives us the opportunity to increase our airport revenue, and it's also going to give us the opportunity to be more energy and utility efficient.

MR. NICHOLS: Now, the terminal facility is a major challenge that we have at Grand Canyon Airport, and as Sonya pointed out, it's dated. It's very old, energy inefficient. When we have aircraft land on the ground, it's very crowded.

The other challenge we have at the airport and in that whole entire region is water. In 2011, the FAA instructed us to close our water source. The airport used to get its water from a catchment system that was located in between the taxiway and runway, and it would catch rainwater, snow, and then pump it up into the holding tanks, you see those holding tanks right there, and then later process

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1 through a water treatment facility and then support -2 supporting the airport operations. FAA determined that that
3 catchment system was a danger to flight operations and
4 instructed us to close it, and it has now been closed.
5 Next slide, please.

6 As a result, we have had to purchase all of our 7 water from the Tusayan Water District. We can only purchase 8 water from them during the spring and the fall. They have 9 basically the capacity of two wells in the town or the City of 10 Tusayan. One well produces about 60 gallons per minute, and 11 one is about 25 gallons per minute. And in their operations 12 of their hotels and during the peak tourist season, 100 13 percent of that water is being used for the town itself, 14 allowing no water to be able to be used by the airport. 15 So one of the concerns that we have at the 16 airport is a methodology for assuring that the airport has the 17 water it needs to not only support operations at the airport, 18 but also protect the aircraft, the flying aircraft and the 19 flying public, in the event of an aircraft accident and/or any 20 kind of forest fire activity. 21 Next slide, please. 22 Now, there -- this -- the well is a point of 23 contention for a lot of different stakeholders. 5	the park? The answer is no, because we turn off we're

The average time people spend at the Grand Canyon is two 14 hours. 15 DIRECTOR HALIKOWSKI: To that point, Mr. Chairman, I think it's important to note we're talking ---16 17 I think Flagstaff's within roughly a 50-mile radius of the 18 canyon. 19 As Mr. Nichols points out, the canyon is a 20 visiting spot, but it's not necessarily the destination point, 21 and certainly the city and -- the City of Flagstaff and 22 Tusayan would partner together, because within that 50-mile 23 radius, if you're looking to travel and see other things, 24 Flagstaff's pretty close, and so coming into the canyon 25 doesn't necessarily mean you're going to spend your entire

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time in Tusayan. There are other destinations that are 1 2 attractive in northern Arizona that people may want to visit. 3 CHAIRMAN CHRISTY: And to that point, regarding the cost of the upgrades that we need to make, where are we 4 5 going to get that money? 6 DIRECTOR HALIKOWSKI: Mr. Nichols? 7 MR. NICHOLS: Most -- where we're going to be 8 getting the money is from the FAA. Now, we are authorized --9 for every passenger that comes into that airport, they are 10 assessed a fee, a tax. 11 CHAIRMAN CHRISTY: Landing fee? 12 MR. NICHOLS: A landing fee or there's 13 passenger taxes that are assessed to them. We get a part of 14 that, just like we get a part of the federal road tax when 15 people buy gasoline in Arizona. We get a piece of it, and 16 that belongs to the airport, and it's for airport's use only. 17 That's one of the rules the FAA has. That's our plan, is to 18 use that funding for the well site and use that funding to 19 build a new terminal facility. And so there's not going to be 20 any money that's being stripped from anybody to support that 21 operation. It's due to the airport. It's for airport 22 operations. If we, the State of Arizona, don't use that 23 money, it goes to other states, which is a -- not a good 24 thing, to allow tax dollars to flow out of Arizona into some 25 other state.

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1 I would like to address the issues regarding 2 the economic viability of the airport. The airport has been 3 in the past -- has not met its own -- has not paid its own 4 way. This year we have. Now, you may -- I would ask the 5 question, why? How did this happen? Two several -- there's 6 two major issues that have happened over the last couple of 7 years. When I took over the airport in '10, '09 and '10, that 8 we hadn't had a rate increase in over -- I want to say it was 9 almost 12, 13 years, and we did get passed a modest rate 10 increase and user fees of those airlines and companies using 11 the airport. That's one thing. 12 We've also cut our operating costs. We've 13 looked wherever we can to find savings in how we operate. 14 There's another area that we've reduced our operating cost. 15 Also, we've been working with our customers and 16 tenants. And we were letting revenue get by, and we were not 17 chasing it down. We're chasing it down. And that's why over 18 the last year, FY '13, we've been chasing every nickel that's 19 owed to us, based on bus companies coming in, taxicab coming 20 in, aircraft services. TO THE HONORABLE ARIZONA TRANSPORTATION BOARD:

The Intermodal Transportation Division has made a thorough investigation concerning the disposal of a portion of a highway easement for right of way originally acquired for use within the above referenced project.

This portion of State Route 260, originally the Payson - Heber Road, was established as a state route by Arizona State Highway Commission Resolution 62-63, dated January 02, 1962, designating it as State Route 160. The route was subsequently established as a state highway by Resolution 62-111, dated July 16, 1962. Ιt was placed on the Federal Aid Primary System by Resolution 65-28, dated April 02, 1965. Additional right of way was established as a state highway by Resolution 67-87, dated December 05, 1967 for necessary improvements. The highway became known as the Payson -Heber - Show Low State Highway, and was renumbered and designated as State Route 260 by Resolution 69-114, dated December 04, 1969. Thereafter, Arizona State Transportation Board Resolution 91-11-A-86, dated November 15, 1991, provided for the acquisition of additional rights of way for various improvements along State Route 260 through Apache, Coconino, Navajo, and Gila Counties. Resolution 2010-02-A-020, dated February 19, 2010, established additional right of way as a state route and state highway for improvements under the Doubtful Canyon project referenced above; and most recently, additional right of way for storm water drainage improvement was established as a state route and state highway through Resolution 2014-08-A-033, dated August 08, 2014.

It is delineated on maps and plans on file in the office of the State Engineer, Intermodal Transportation Division, Phoenix, Arizona, entitled: "Right of Way Plan of the PAYSON -SHOW LOW HIGHWAY, Kohls Ranch - Christopher Creek, Project F-053-2-804"; and on maps and plans entitled: "Right of Way Plans of the PAYSON - SHOW LOW HIGHWAY, Doubtful Canyon, Project 260 GI 269 H4698 01R / F-053-2-822", and is shown in Appendix "A" attached hereto.

All other rights of way, easements and appurtenances thereto, subject to the provisions of Arizona Revised Statutes Section 28-7210, shall continue as they existed prior to the disposal of the portion of easement right of way depicted in Appendix "A".

On August 27, 2014, the Maricopa Association of Governments (MAG) approved consultation on a proposed major amendment to the Regional Transportation Plan. The proposed amendment is to add a five (5) mile light rail transit (LRT) extension on Central Avenue from downtown Phoenix, near the existing light rail transit line as it turns at Washington and Jefferson streets, terminating at Baseline Road, to the MAG 2035 Regional Transportation Plan, contingent on the finding of air quality conformity. Comments and recommendations regarding the proposed major amendment are due by October 3, 2014.

As set forth in Arizona Revised Statute (A.R.S.) 28-6353, the Regional Public Transportation Authority, the State Transportation Board, and the Maricopa County Board of Supervisors, by a majority vote within thirty days after receiving a proposed major amendment, shall submit a written recommendation that the proposed amendment be approved, modified or disapproved. Within thirty days after receiving a proposed major amendment, shall submit a written recommendation that the proposed major amendment, the Native American Indian communities, cities and towns in the County, and the Citizens Transportation Oversight Committee may also submit a written recommendation that the amendment be approved, modified or disapproved.

The proposed additional LRT service on South Central Avenue is forecast to significantly increase ridership on the light rail system with the extension from Washington/Jefferson to Baseline Road. The Locally Preferred Alternative was selected because it offers the highest ridership potential, greatest level of mobility improvements, potential for economic development, and the highest level of community support. The current bus route that serves South Central Avenue, Route 0, is one of the top 10 bus routes for ridership in Metropolitan Phoenix. The South Central Avenue LRT Extension will provide upgraded service to these transit users, attract more riders, help with congestion, and support future economic development along the corridor.

Regarding the LRT extension on South Central Avenue, on August 27, 2014, the MAG Regional Council approved: (1) the Locally Preferred Alternative (LPA) for the South Central Avenue project, including light rail transit on Central Avenue from Washington/Jefferson to Baseline Road; and (2) consult with the State Transportation Board, the Maricopa County Board of Supervisors, the Regional Public Transportation Authority, the Indian Communities, the cities and towns in Maricopa County, and the Citizens

Transportation Oversight Committee for the major amendment process, as required by A.R.S. 28-6353, on the proposal to add the five-mile light rail transit (LRT) extension on Central Avenue from downtown Phoenix, near the existing LRT as it turns at Washington and Jefferson streets, terminating at Baseline Road to the 2035 Regional Transportation Plan, contingent on the finding of air quality conformity.

The MAG Transportation Policy Committee (TPC) is required to consider any written recommendations submitted by any of the reviewing entities regarding the proposed amendment to extend the LRT system on Central Avenue from Washington/Jefferson Streets to Baseline Road, and shall recommend approval, disapproval or modification of the proposed amendment to the MAG Regional Council for consideration. An affirmative vote of seventeen members of the TPC is required for the recommendation of a proposed major amendment to the MAG Regional Council, if the amendment fails to receive approval of either the Regional Public Transportation Authority, the State Transportation Board, or the Maricopa County Board of Supervisors.

BACKGROUND

In 2011 Valley Metro and the city of Phoenix initiated a transit study analyzing the opportunity to connect downtown Phoenix with South Central with high capacity transit. The study, called an Alternatives Analysis, included the area from 7th Street to 7th Avenue and Washington Street to Dobbins Road to determine what type of high capacity transit would best serve the community and where the best alignment or route would be located.


The three transit types that were evaluated were bus rapid transit, light rail, and modern streetcar. The route locations that were considered were Central/1st Avenue, 7th Street, and 7th Avenue from the existing light rail system to Baseline Road.

LOCALLY PREFERRED ALTERNATIVE

After two years of technical analysis and working with the local community, staff is recommending light rail on Central and 1st Avenues connecting from the existing light rail system at Washington/Jefferson Streets south to Baseline Road.

The study used a wide variety of criteria including ridership potential, land use, economic development, and traffic impacts to analyze options and determine that light rail would best serve the South Central community. With extensive community input, street configurations, proposed station locations, and possible extensions for future studies were also identified and included in the recommendation.

Valley Metro proposes a 4-lane street configuration (2 lanes in each direction) connecting from the existing light rail system in downtown Phoenix to just north of Watkins Street, transitioning to a 2-lane street configuration (1 lane in each direction) at Watkins Street south to Baseline Road. The proposed station locations are at Lincoln Street, Buckeye Road, Broadway Road, Southern Avenue, and Baseline Road. Three additional station locations are identified for further study; Watkins Street, the Audubon Center, and Roeser Road. Staff also identified Baseline Road east and west bound, and south on Central from Baseline to the South Mountain Park area entrance as areas for further study in the future.

Locally Preferred Alternative and Proposed Major Amendment to Add the Light Rail Transit Extension on Central Avenue: Washington/Jefferson to Baseline Road to the 2035 Regional Transportation Plan

SUMMARY:

METRO Light Rail and the City of Phoenix are requesting approval of the Locally Preferred Alternative (LPA) for South Central Avenue and to add the five-mile light rail transit (LRT) extension on Central Avenue from Washington/Jefferson to Baseline Road to the 2035 Regional Transportation Plan (RTP). The preliminary estimated capital cost for the project is approximately \$680 million and will be funded through City of Phoenix sales tax funds and potentially, federal funds. No regional Public Transportation Funds/Proposition 400 funds are planned to be used for this project. Adding this project to the RTP requires a major amendment in accordance with A.R.S. 28-6301. The process to implement a major amendment is outlined in A.R.S 28-6353. This requires MAG to consult with the State Transportation Board, the Maricopa County Board of Supervisors, the Regional Public Transportation Authority, the Indian Communities, the cities and towns in Maricopa County, and the Citizens Transportation Oversight Committee. Following that consultation, the item would be brought back through the MAG process for consideration and possible approval.

An Alternatives Analysis for the South Central Corridor in Phoenix was initiated in 2012 by Valley METRO Rail. The purpose of this study is to identify a preferred transit technology and alignment for the corridor. The South Central Corridor was originally identified for Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) service in the Proposition 400 plan developed in 2003.

In May 2013, the Phoenix City Council approved a preliminary leading alternative and recommended that a Community Working Group (CWG) be formed to assist in further developing the South Central alternative. Valley METRO Rail and City of Phoenix staffs, and the CWG reviewed street configurations and proposed station locations. The CWG met monthly for six months and supported the alternative that is recommended as the LPA.

In December 2013 the Phoenix City Council approved the LPA, which includes light rail transit on Central Avenue from Baseline Road north to Downtown Phoenix, then using the Central/1st Avenue couplet under the Union Pacific Railroad and Madison Street to connect into the existing light rail system. The LPA was selected because it offers the highest ridership potential, greatest level of mobility improvements, potential for economic development and has the highest level of community support. The City Council also agreed that further analysis and community engagement to finalize station locations and a roadway configuration (e.g., 4-lane, 2-lane, bike lines and landscaping) are necessary. In addition, the City of Phoenix supported future study west, east and south of Baseline Road for possible future light rail extensions.

In April 2014, the Phoenix City Council approved the creation of a community-based committee to assist the City to develop a transit plan and funding strategy to address transit needs after the current Transit 2000 sales tax expires in 2020. In conjunction with this agenda item, the Council also approved a financing plan for the South Central Corridor to be included in the MAG Regional Transportation Plan Page 96 of 266

(RTP). The financing plan makes the reasonable assumption of an extension to Transit 2000 to provide local funding for design, construction and operating expenses for this light rail project.

On June 19, 2014, the METRO Board of Directors accepted the South Central LPA and recommended it be forwarded to MAG to conduct the Major Amendment process to include the South Central project in the Regional Transportation Plan to be completed in 2034.

These actions make it possible for the South Central Light Rail Transit Project to be added as a Major Amendment to the RTP for completion in 2034. This schedule may change as Phoenix completes the development of its transit plan and associated future funding is defined.

Cost and Budget

The preliminary estimated capital costs for the project are approximately \$680 million and will be funded through Phoenix sales tax funds and possible federal funds. No regional Public Transportation Funds are planned for this project. Annual operating costs are approximately \$16 million per year for operations and will be paid by Phoenix.

Major Amendment Process

The proposed amendment to the RTP qualifies as a Major Amendment in accordance with A.R.S. 28-6301, which states that a Major Amendment means 'the addition or deletion of . . . a fixed guideway transit system that either exceeds one mile in length or exceeds an estimated cost of forty million dollars as provided in the RTP.'

If approved, the next steps would be to consult with the State Transportation Board, the Maricopa County Board of Supervisors, the Regional Public Transportation Authority, the Indian Communities, the cities and towns in Maricopa County, and the Citizens Transportation Oversight Committee for the major amendment process in September 2014, as required by A.R.S. 28-6353. After that, this Major Amendment would come back through the MAG process in October - December 2014 to be approved for an amendment to the RTP pending an air quality conformity analysis. Air Quality Conformity Analysis/New Finding of Conformity would be completed sometime in Spring, 2015.

PUBLIC INPUT:

There was extensive public involvement through the alternatives analysis study by Valley METRO Rail that included a formal City of Phoenix community working group and 70 meetings with businesses and organizations.

PROS & CONS:

PROS: The LPA for the South Central LRT extension was selected because it offers the highest ridership potential, greatest level of mobility improvements, potential for economic development and has the highest level of community support.

CONS: None.

TECHNICAL & POLICY IMPLICATIONS:

TECHNICAL: The alternatives analysis conducted by METRO found that the recommended LPA will best meet the purpose and need for the project, meeting the travel demands of increased riders anticipated within the South Central Avenue study area as well as providing the potential to promote

economic development opportunities in coordination with transit-supportive policies and investments by the City of Phoenix.

POLICY: The South Central LPA was accepted by the City of Phoenix Council in December 2013 and the METRO Board of Directors on June 19, 2014. The proposed amendment is a major amendment to the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) since more than one-mile of fixed guideway transit is being added.

ACTION NEEDED:

Recommend approval of (1) the Locally Preferred Alternative (LPA) for the South Central Avenue project, including light rail transit on Central Avenue from Washington/Jefferson to Baseline Road; and (2) consult with the State Transportation Board, the Maricopa County Board of Supervisors, the Regional Public Transportation Authority, the Indian Communities, the cities and towns in Maricopa County, and the Citizens Transportation Oversight Committee for the major amendment process, as required by A.R.S. 28-6353, on the proposal to add the five-mile light rail transit (LRT) extension on Central Avenue from downtown Phoenix (near the existing LRT turns at Washington and Jefferson streets) to Baseline Road to the 2035 Regional Transportation Plan, contingent on the finding of air quality conformity.

PRIOR COMMITTEE ACTIONS:

This item is on the July 31, 2014, Transportation Review Committee agenda. An update will be given at the Management Committee meeting.

Three bids were received on this project, ranging from \$716,046.61 to \$855,247.40. The low bid is \$117,472.61.45 more (20% higher) than the Department estimate.

The amount of the low bid, plus estimated construction administration and contingency costs, exceeds the amount of federal funds and City of Yuma funds that are programmed and available for this project. Because the amount of federal funds for this project is capped, the amount of the low bid would make the City of Yuma responsible for about \$155,000 in additional costs above and beyond the amount they had previously agreed to contribute to the project. Because the bid amount exceeds the project budget, the City has asked the Department to <u>not</u> award this project and instead re-evaluate the scope of work and re-advertise this project at a future date.
