CHAIRMAN STRATTON: And we will call to order the board meeting. We will now move on to Item No. 1, the director's report, for information and discussion only.

Floyd Roehrich, please.

MR. ROEHRICH: Thank you, Mr. -- thank you, Mr. Chairman. I do want to extend along the director's regret. Something came up and he has to -- he was conflicted and had to attend that issue. He does not have any last minute items, but he does want Katy Proctor to go ahead and provide a legislative update.

So, Katy, would you please provide the legislative update?

MS. PROCTOR: Yes. Good morning, members.

For the State legislative update today, I'd like to let you know that it is actually the 68th day of session, and so far we have 1,824 pieces of legislation that have been introduced. As of this morning, 70 bills have been signed by the Governor. Next week is the last week for traditional committees to hear bills in committee. Only the appropriations will meet the week after that. So most of next week will determine which bills continue in the process and which are essentially dead. We will update our list to reflect that and get that out to you late next week, and you should see a significant decrease in the numbers of bills at that point.

Project bills do continue to move through the process. However, they will likely be held up for inclusion in the budget when we get to that point in the process. We are still hearing that \$200 million box number being thrown around for highway project bills, and it's important to note that of those independent bills moving through the process right now, not all of them are on the state system. So it's probably very likely that much of that box will be a mixture of state system and other local projects.

On the federal side, there's a lot happening right now, as I'm sure you're aware. Congress has passed the American Rescue Plan Act earlier this month, effectively sending about 12.2 billion to the State of Arizona out of an Arizona total impact of over 24 billion. Transportation-related funds are limited to mass transit grants for — at airports. However, the overall impact of the larger group of funds coming into the state remains to be seen.

As soon as Congress moved the ARP Act, we also saw a shift in transportation. This means a new focus on passing the surface transportation and reauthorization package. Senate EPW met late last month to hear high-level priorities for a plan, and the House appears to be preparing for the same. Secretary Buttigieg is on deck next week for House transportation for to discuss his priorities going forward as well for infrastructure.

In the House, an agreement has been reached to 1 return to an earmark process, and process reforms are being 2 3 developed right now for transparency and limitations around The Senate is separately working on an agreement in that 5 area, and they expect to hear something soon on that as well. We continue to remain in contact with our 6 7 Congressional members and are happy to provide information as requested. 8 And that concludes my report this morning. I'd 9 10 be happy to take any questions you might have. CHAIRMAN STRATTON: Are there any questions for 11 12 Katy? MR. KNIGHT: Mr. Chair, this is Board Member 13 14 Knight. CHAIRMAN STRATTON: Okay, Gary. Go ahead. 15 MR. KNIGHT: Of the -- of the bills that the 16 17 Governor's signed, I'm not familiar with all of them, but are there any that are transportation related? 18 19 MS. PROCTOR: Mr. Chair and Board Member Knight, 2.0 of the 70 bills that have been signed, none of them are project 21 fund-related bills. There are six bills that we are tracking 22 specifically for ADOT purposes for implementation on the process side, but nothing that is related to funding. 2.3 2.4 MR. KNIGHT: Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Chair. 25 CHAIRMAN STRATTON: Thank you, Gary.

Any other questions? 1 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Chairman --2 3 CHAIRMAN STRATTON: Floyd, I have a question, but 4 I think it would -- should be directed to you rather than Katy. 5 On these projects that are being considered in the Legislature that are not on state highways, does that have 6 7 any effect on ADOT? Are we involved in any way? And if so, do we recover our money that we expend on that for man hours? 8 MR. ROEHRICH: Mr. Chairman, it depends on what 9 10 the local county wants. Usually the money is given directly to them, but in the past sometimes the local governments have asked 11 12 the department to step in and assist them with the project, 1.3 whether that's contracting or inspection or such as things like 14 that, and what we do, we will enter into an intergovernmental 15 agreement to capture the costs that we feel are appropriate. So 16 a lot depends on bonds, what the project is, who's getting the 17 funding and if they request our assistance or not. CHAIRMAN STRATTON: Okay. Thank you. 18 19 Do we have any other questions for Floyd or Katy? 2.0 Okay. Hearing none, we'll move on to Item 2, district engineer's report, for information and discussion only. 21 22 Rod Lane, Southcentral District Engineer. Rod. 2.3 MR. LANE: Good morning, Mr. Chair, members of 24 25 the Board. I'm going to give you a brief presentation this

morning regarding what's going on in the ADOT Southcentral District.

So if we can move on to the next slide, please.

One of the projects, larger projects we've got
moving forward in the Southcentral District is State Route 189
from the international border up to Grand Avenue. That project
was delivered using our design/bid -- using the design/bid/build
method. The design/build team is Ames and Horrocks. It has a
contract value of \$82 million. ADOT's general engineering
consultant on this project is AECOM. The project is moving
along very nicely. We're about 60 percent through with this
job. We expect it to be ending in the end of 2021.

Next slide, please.

The I-10 Ina to Ruthrauff traffic interchange is also an important project down in the Southcentral District.

This one was delivered using the low bid method, along with an A plus B component, which is the bidding of time for the project, along with the items. The successful contractor was Sundt Construction, for a value of \$80 million. This is a new diamond interchange with a bridge going over I-10, over the Union Pacific Railroad, and over a local street called Highway Drive. We expect this project to end also in -- or excuse me -- in -- by the end of this year. We're probably again 60 percent done with this job, and it's going along very nicely, coming together well.

The Houghton Road traffic interchange at I-10 is going to be the Southcentral District's and the PAG region's first diverging diamond interchange. You can see on the bottom right side of the screen how that diverging diamond works, where the traffic actually switches from one side to the other side, thereby making the left movement onto the on ramp conflict free. So it's a much more efficient traffic interchange. This contract was awarded — this \$23.4 million contract was awarded to Ames Construction through our low bid method, and we're also expecting to have this job done towards the end of this year. We're about 40 percent through with this project, and it's moving along very nicely.

Next one. Next slide, please.

A preservation project is just getting kicked off down in the northern part of Santa Cruz County and also in the southern part of Pima County. It's occurring on I-19. It's going from Tubac to West Arivaca Road. That was also delivered using our low bid method, with a contract value of \$17.26 million. Fisher Sand and Gravel was the contractor -- successful contractor on that project. It's just kind of getting -- starting off, they're doing some crushing in the plants and doing the bridgework. Paving will probably be starting in a -- about a month or so. So we expect that project also to be done in late '21, later this year.

Another project being done on I-19, which is also a preservation project. It's also delivered using our low bid method for contract value of 13.12 million. This project is a little farther north on I-19, just above Green Valley, from Milepost 42.5 to 50.3. It also includes a bridge deck rehabilitation for Sahuarita Road. It goes over I-19. This contract, \$13.12 million contract, was also delivered using our low bid method, with Fisher Sand and Gravel being the successful contractor. This one's just now getting started, and we'll expect to see that one done in early next year, early January-ish.

Next slide, please.

Another preservation project, also on I-10, in the Benson area. It's called the Benson bypass, but it's actually right on I-10. This was a low bid project for \$7.33 million awarded to FNF Construction. We expect to have this project done kind of the end of this summer. We're about 40 percent through with this one, and it's going very nicely.

Next slide, please.

Another very important project for the PAG region is SR-77 from I-10 to Calle Concordia. So this is a preservation project that actually includes three sections of work. The first section goes from I-10 to River, and that's more of a traditional pavement preservation project. The next

section goes from River to Calle Concordia. That's also a

We'll now move on to the financial report with 1 Kristine Ward, Agenda Item 4, for information and discussion 2 3 only. 4 Kristine. 5 MS. WARD: Good morning, board members. Rhett, thank you very much. If you could go to 6 7 my first slide, I'd appreciate it. Or my next one. There we 8 go. So for the year, we're, as you can see, running 9 10 about 4.6 above forecast, with about \$1 billion -- we've just crossed the 1 billion mark in revenues collected. 11 In terms of 12 what that means for the State Highway Fund, that means about \$17 million additional flowing into the State Highway Fund, and 13 with your actions last month, you'll recall that we released 14 15 \$80 million into the program. So we have released these extra 16 dollars into the program, and they -- and you programmed them 17 last month. With regards to -- you -- you will note that we 18 19 had a significant change from that 5.8 percent above forecast 2.0 last month and 4.6 above forecast this month, and in my next slide -- Rhett, if you'd go into that -- I'll give you a little 21

So you'll be able to see here where the variations were for this last month. The month of February data is what we're looking at. And you'll see that gas tax continues

insight as to how that happened.

to lag behind significantly, but one of the primary reasons that we came back into -- and closer into our forecast target zone is due to VLT, and this is one of those difficult to predict kinds of things that are the result of the pandemic, because what you're seeing in that decline, that 7.5 percent decline over the prior year, and 9.3 percent change in forecast for VLT, what you're seeing there is the result of rental vehicles not -- people not renting cars. We charge a rental surcharge in the state, and if cars are rented -- if cars are not rented, if people do not rent them, we do not get the surcharge, and so that's what you're seeing. That money is remitted to the -- to the department once a year in the month of February. Just thought it was a curiosity that I would give you some insight on.

If we can go to the next slide, Rhett. Thanks so much.

So we are about 3.5 percent above forecast with about 350 million -- -15 million dollars collected year to date. We had a strong retail sales -- retail sales have been shockingly strong throughout the year. This is a -- what we believe is the result of the stimulus that have been coming, and keep in mind now we have this next round of stimulus with the ARP Act, and that -- this, of course, doesn't even capture those stimulus checks that are going out to folks now.

So we're about 6.5 percent above our forecast

year to date on retail sales. Unfortunately, restaurant and bar 1 still lags significantly behind last year at this time. 2 3 If we could go on to the next slide, I'd appreciate it, Rhett. 4 CHAIRMAN STRATTON: Kristine. 5 MS. WARD: Yes, sir. 6 7 CHAIRMAN STRATTON: I have a question for you. Where would the tax on the recreational marijuana show up in 8 these charts? If I do my math right, I believe January showed 9 10 that we should get a little over \$100,000 for that month in our share for transportation. 11 12 MS. WARD: I am not entirely sure, sir. I will check on that for you. 13 I will tell you the projections -- as you just 14 15 mentioned, the projections and how much we get showing up in 16 RARF at this point is really de minimis. So it's not even a 17 rounding error at this point in our world, but I will check which category that is showing up in for you, sir, and have it 18 19 for you -- well, actually, I will just email it or have it for 2.0 you at the next board meeting, if that would be okay. CHAIRMAN STRATTON: Next board meeting's fine. 21 was just wondering if it was having any effect on any of these 22 lines. That's all. 2.3 MS. WARD: Mr. Chair, we do not expect to see any 24 25 impact from those moneys -- I think it was Prop 207 or 208. Ι**'**m

sorry. I get them mixed up here -- but we don't expect any 1 funds to really impact RARF until FY '22, and at that point, I 2 3 believe our calculations were around \$3 million. So it's not something we're going to see in, you know, large amounts, and 5 that's because the way that those -- that funding flow is 6 structured is there are a number of distributions that come off 7 of that flow of revenue --CHAIRMAN STRATTON: Yes. 8 MS. WARD: -- before it gets to us. 9 10 CHAIRMAN STRATTON: Yeah. Okay. Thank you. Thank you, sir. And I'll get that 11 MS. WARD: 12 information for you as to where it will show up. 13 Rhett, if you could transition to the next slide. 14 I don't have any further information on the 15 American Rescue Plan that Katy reported on earlier. I'll tell you we are -- we are watching, particularly -- we just don't 16 17 know at this point how much is going to flow into transportation. As you can see and as I reported on the 18 19 Regional Area Road Fund, the slides before, people are -- we are 2.0 seeing retail sales that are exceeding what we would have expected. It's just very difficult to predict at this time as 21 22 to what folks are going to do with their stimulus checks. We were looking at data -- actually, I was 23 24 looking at a chart this morning that shows personal savings, 25 people's savings at record all-time highs, as well as we are

So the tribal transportation update, we've been doing tribal consultations for several years. We currently have two people that are working on it. We have two tribal liaisons that work within MPD. One of the thing — one of the reasons that we do this is we do have so many tribal activities that we try and assist on or have consultations on, as well as there's a state statute that follows through and actually kind of lines out the requirements of what the liaisons do.

So next slide.

So the two people that we have that assist us that are our tribal liaisons, we have Ermalinda Gene, who has been with ADOT for several years. She's been doing the tribal liaison work for the last three years, and she took the place of Don Sneed, who actually came back to work with us, and so he retired and has come back to work and has picked right up where he took off.

We have had so much work. Don used to work by

himself, and we've had so much workload in working with the different tribes across the state that it now takes two to keep up with everything. So we've had — Ermalinda has taken the northern region of the state, and Don has now taken the southern region of the state, so that they can keep up with all of the requirements through the different tribal needs and wants that we can assist with throughout the year.

So we broke up the two regions. This is kind of a map that kind of shows if anybody has any questions or anything as to who you contact. Obviously, any time you contact one or the other, they'll assist on any questions. Again, the northern region is handled through Ermalinda, and the Southern portions through Don Sneed.

So as far as the work goes on the five-year programs, we are currently still working on the tentative program, and we will continue to do that all the way through June. We have the projects that are in the current program. We're taking and looking and evaluating the cost for those projects to make sure that the budgeted items, the budgeted amounts that we have in the program are true and up to date. So we're working on making sure that we have all that information and data. That's currently ongoing.

We are also tracking potential projects through

the State Legislature. As Katy had just stated earlier, there's a massive amount of work that's going on in the Legislature with several potential projects that could come through. We're also tracking the COVID relief, any of the federal funding that is — may potentially show up in making sure that we're accounting for everything. Kristine's been a tremendous help on that, as she just stated earlier.

For the 2023 to 2027 program, we've already started looking at our P2P process. We're actually getting ready to do a deep dive on that process next week, just making sure that we are -- have everything -- all of our ducks in a row, as well as trying to implement any improvements we possibly can into that process, keeping it up to date, doing some lessons learned and so forth. So we're currently working on that.

We also have -- we're -- some continued improvements in the preparation of the five-year program. Trying to make sure that, one, we're staying as transparent as we possibly can in putting together the program itself, as well as making sure that we're getting input from all of the areas necessary, including all of our government relations people so that we're getting information either from the Governor's office or the Legislature or getting information back out to them, as well as to the communities with our -- through our communications department as well.

And so that's pretty much what we have going, if

Last month, in February, we finalized 8 eight projects totaling 21.2 million, and year to date, we have 9 10 finalized 40 projects. That is all I had under the state engineer's 11 report. I am open for any questions. 12 13 CHAIRMAN STRATTON: Thank you, Dallas. 14 Dallas, I actually have a question. Can you tell me where we're at with the Lion Springs design? 15 16 MR. HAMMIT: Yes, Mr. Chair. Right now, 17 currently, the Lion Springs design is at the 60 percent stage, basically our stage three. We are -- we'll be looking to come 18 19 to the Board. The project right now needs approximately \$900,000 to continue. There's a section that is being 20 21 redesigned which will save us over 6 million -- 6 to 7 million 22 in right-of-way costs. So it's good money spent to redesign that section as they looked at it. One of the things on current problems -- excuse me -- current projects, we have a -- both a oil -- for asphalt oil, escalator. So at the time of bid, we know what the market price is, and then each month we look -- if it's gone up or down, we make that adjustment. That helps us and our contractors be -- take away some of the speculation at bid time. We do the same thing with fuel oil for equipment. So if it -- if it goes up, we will see some increase in price, especially on our paving jobs, which we buy a lot of oil on.

CHAIRMAN STRATTON: Okay. Thank you.

MR. HAMMIT: And thank you, Mr. Chair.

Item 8A is a rest area rehabilitation. This is on Interstate 10, the Bouse Wash Rest Area. The low bid was \$4,847,234. The State's estimate was \$4,188,878. We saw higher than expected pricing in our concrete pavement, some of the mechanical work at the rest area and the metal partitions in the restrooms.
