Welcome to a meeting of the Arizona State Transportation Board. The Transportation Board consists of seven private citizen members appointed by the Governor, representing specific transportation districts. Board members are appointed for terms of six years each, with terms expiring on the third Monday in January of the appropriate year.

BOARD AUTHORITY

Although the administration of the Department of Transportation is the responsibility of the director, the Transportation Board has been granted certain policy powers in addition to serving in an advisory capacity to the director. In the area of highways the Transportation Board is responsible for establishing a system of state routes. It determines which routes are accepted into the state system and which state routes are to be improved. The Board has final authority on establishing the opening, relocating, altering, vacating or abandoning any portion of a state route or a state highway. The Transportation Board awards construction contracts and monitors the status of construction projects. With respect to aeronautics the Transportation Board distributes monies appropriated to the Aeronautics Division from the State Aviation Fund for planning, design, development, land acquisition, construction and improvement of publicly-owned airport facilities. The Board also approves airport construction. The Transportation Board has the exclusive authority to issue revenue bonds for financing needed transportation improvements throughout the state. As part of the planning process the Board determines priority planning with respect to transportation facilities and annually adopts the five year construction program.

PUBLIC INPUT

Members of the public may appear before the Transportation Board to be heard on any transportation-related issue. Persons wishing to protest any action taken or contemplated by the Board may appear before this open forum. The Board welcomes citizen involvement, although because of Arizona's open meeting laws, no actions may be taken on items which do not appear on the formal agenda. This does not, however, preclude discussion of other issues.

MEETINGS

The Transportation Board typically meets on the third Friday of each month. Meetings are held in locations throughout the state. Due to potential health risks at large public gatherings, the Transportation Board asks that people attending Board meetings in person take safety precautions they feel appropriate to protect themselves and others. In addition, for the time being the Transportation Board will conduct concurrent telephonic/WebEx virtual meetings. In addition to the regular business meetings held each month, the Board may conduct at least one public hearings each year to receive input regarding the proposed five-year construction program. Meeting dates are established for the following year at the December organization meeting of the Board.

BOARD MEETING PROCEDURE

Board members receive the agenda and all backup information one week before the meeting is held. They have studied each item on the agenda and have consulted with Department of Transportation staff when necessary. If no additional facts are presented at the meeting, they often act on matters, particularly routine ones, without further discussion. In order to streamline the meetings the Board has adopted the "consent agenda" format, allowing agenda items to be voted on en masse unless discussion is requested by one of the board members or Department of Transportation staff members.

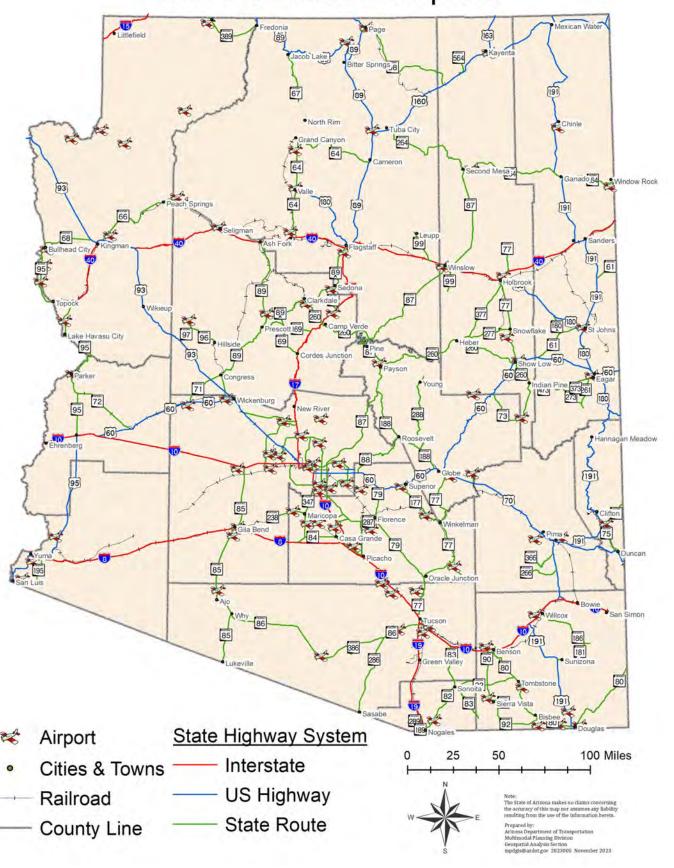
ORDER DEFERRAL AND ACCELERATIONS OF AGENDA ITEMS, VOTE WITHOUT DISCUSSION

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: (Inaudible) you say, Greg, is you want us to hold our questions until the presentation has been completed and -- but we can feverishly take our own notes and then get ready to ask those questions when we're done?

MR. BYRES: Either way. Actually, if you -- if you want to step in with a question during the presentation, please do. That way we're getting those questions answered in the time (indiscernible).

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Okay. So board members, in the, again, interest of time and organization, just jump in with your question. You don't need permission to speak. Thanks.

MR. KELSO: Great. Okay. Thanks. And again, thanks. Chair -- Chair Daniels and Vice Chair Maxwell and the rest of the Board. Appreciate the opportunity to present an update on the State Route 347 corridor projects.

23 Again, my name is Trent Kelso, and I'm the ADOT 24 corridor manager.

Well, before we start talking numbers and

timelines, there are a few things to keep in mind. The estimates are current as of 2025 and have been escalated to align with the year of expenditure. Additionally, the estimates and timelines may increase due to many uncertainties, such as the ones shown here. So with that, let's go ahead and get started.

So this is the map of the 13-mile long corridor, which is contained entirely within the Gila River Indian Community. The corridor implementation plan includes four separately funded projects that include pavement rehabilitation, intersection improvements, a new traffic interchange, and corridor widening.

So let's take a closer look at the four projects in chronological corridor.

The first project is the pavement rehabilitation project. This project will repaye State Route 347 from the city of Maricopa to I-10. The design is currently at the 95 percent level. Waiting on environmental clearance. We're targeting the project to be bid ready by the end of this year, if not sooner. This project is fully funded in fiscal year 2026 of the tentative program in the amount of \$31 million, and no additional funding is needed for this project.

The second project is the Mammoth Way, otherwise known as Cement Plant Access Road and Casa Blanca Road intersection improvements. We continue to work to gain

consensus from the community for the improvements at these two intersections, and at the same time are progressing other longer lead items like geotechnical investigations and environmental work as we can. We expect to be bid ready by April of next year, although this project in particular has the most uncertainty in its timeline, just based upon the place we are in the development process.

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Trent, really quick, what does "Community concurrence" mean? Like, what exactly is that? I mean, waiting -- you're not waiting for a vote, so what does it mean?

MR. KELSO: Meaning the Gila River Indian Community, we present the proposed improvements to them in the form of a letter or a memorandum and ask for their litigation team's concurrence with the proposed improvements prior to moving forward.

So in this case, at Mammoth Way, we're considering additional alternatives. The alternative we're considering now would be to grade separate the access to and from the cement plant, due to the community desire to add a second access point on the west side of State Route 347. We feel like this is -- this alternative would provide a more free flow traffic over the State Route 347 main line as well as make those merge/diverge movements much safer than being in two signalized intersections.

1 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you.

MR. KELSO: So two laws passed in 2023 and 2024, appropriated a total of 19,901,000 for these two intersections. 5.3 million of the appropriation will be used over the coming year to complete design, acquire right-of-way, relocate utilities and complete cultural recovery. That leaves 14.6 million for construction, resulting in a shortfall of 10.8 million for construction in fiscal year 2026.

The third project is the new Riggs Road Interchange project, where we'll be converting the existing at grade signalized intersection into a tight diamond interchange with State Route 347 passing over Riggs Road and on and off ramps for access to and from Riggs Road. We expect the project to be bid ready by late summer next year.

Prior year appropriations have provided \$60.5 million of funding, 11.5 million for scoping, design, and right-of-way acquisition, and 45 -- 49 million for construction in fiscal year '28. However, current development and construction cost estimates total nearly 102 million, 101.9 mil, resulting in a nearly \$41.4 million shortfall.

Senate Bill 1617 and House Bill 2557 appropriate a net increase of the entire shortfall amount, 41.4 million, from the General Fund. And if those proposed amounts are enacted in this year's budget, the interchange will be fully funded, allowing the ADOT team to continue developing the

project to meet the projected timeline.

And the final project is the corridor widening project. This project would add one lane in each direction from the city of Maricopa to I-10, and improve the two remaining intersections at Maricopa Road and (indiscernible) Road. Approximately 6.1 miles of the corridor is in Maricopa County, and 7.3 miles in Pinal County. Both of the segments should be ready by calendar year 2027 if funding is identified.

So of the over \$232 million needed to develop and construct a widening, 96 million has been funded, 6 million of which was appropriated by the Legislature in 2023, and 90 million of which is included in phase two of Prop 479 to construct the Maricopa County segment. This results in a nearly \$136 million shortfall, including 1.5 million in additional funding for design and cultural recovery, and nearly 135 million to construct the third lane throughout the Pinal County segment.

We've also broken out approximately \$5.8 million to construct the third lane in each direction through the Casa Blanca and Mammoth Lane intersection projects -- or project. With the potential advancement of the widening and the differing timelines between the two projects, adding the third lane as part of the intersection project may prove most economical and may make the most sense.

So to summarize, there's approximately \$208 million of funding available, while the updated year of

expenditure cost estimate is 396 million. This leaves an approximate shortfall of 188 million.

Next slide.

24.6 million of that shortfall is in fiscal year 2026, and the remainder is in fiscal year 2027. As I mentioned earlier, the two bills being discussed in this year's budget negotiations account for 41.4 million of the estimated shortfalls. Should those amounts be enacted, the shortfall would be reduced to approximately \$12.4 million in fiscal '26 and 135 million in fiscal '27.

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Trent, I'm going to stop you real fast. Greg has his hand up.

MR. KELSO: Okay.

MR. BYRES: So I wanted to clarify one thing. You had asked a question about GRIC's compliance or their review of -- everything's contingent on that. This particular -- all of these projects are not the regular kind of projects that we have where we're -- we're sitting in a right-of-way.

In this particular case, we are sitting in an easement on GRIC land, and so, consequently, they have the ability to stop all of these projects in their tracks. We have worked diligently to try and maintain a relationship with GRIC, giving them advanced ideas of what's going on, make -- keeping them in the loop of everything on this project from day one.

And so, consequently, we keep that and maintain

that throughout this so that we're -- this is a working relationship, and they're partners in all of these projects. So I just want to make sure that everyone's aware of exactly that, that no matter what, GRIC still has final word on what we can and cannot do here.

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Yeah. And Governor Lewis has been such a pro economic development governor for the Gila River Indian Community. I've been so impressed with his contribution. Is anybody representing the Gila River Indian Community on the phone or participating in this study session? Does anybody --

VICE CHAIR MAXWELL: Chair, while we wait, I think we all understand the importance in the role, and like you said, they can stop any of these projects at any time, Greg, but have you seen any indication that they're leaning that way? Because I agree with Chair Daniels. You know, Roe has been phenomenal on the economic development side of the house. Is there -- we understand that's a potential, but have you seen any indication that shows that they're hesitant at all about this expansion?

MR. BYRES: No, I have not, but the one thing that they are very interested in, and Trent had mentioned this, is we have several design alternatives. They have a lot of influence on which one of those alternatives we select.

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Understood. I just wanted

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: And where they overlap maybe.

MR. KELSO: Yeah. Well, other than the corridor widening, all of the projects would overlap before the widening being done. The last one ready would take approximately 24 months to complete. The other projects would overlap, and generally, the -- an interchange like Riggs Road would take 12 to 18 months to complete. The intersection improvement project at Mammoth and Casa Blanca would take around 12 months to complete, and then the pavement rehabilitation similarly, around 12 months to complete, maybe -- maybe eight months.

18 with the pavement preservation, into one project to optimize the 2 schedule and reduce the timeline of construction?

MR. BYRES: So because of -- the way these -- the way the projects are set up right now, if we had 100 percent funding today, we could realign some of the design processes to an extent and pull this together in one project. That would be the optimum way to be able to do this, because not only that, but we would get a scale of economics for the project that would be -- could drive the cost down. But with the City's funding 10 and with the County's funding, we still have a substantial shortfall. So, you know, at this point in time, it's a matter 12 of trying to come up with that shortfall being compensated for 13 before we could try and realign this into a single project.

MR. ELTERS: So, Madam Chair, Greg, if I can follow up, in going back to the previous slide, to this slide, there, looking at the total potential reduced funding shortfall. which is 147 million for the entire corridor, if indeed there's 50 from this -- 50 million from the City of Maricopa and 20 million from Pinal County, that makes 70. So the gap, if you take 70 out of 147, just so we're all talking about the same numbers, we're talking about a \$77 million gap still to deliver the entire project as you want; is that correct?

MR. BYRES: That's only if the legislative bills 1617 and 2557 are also approved. Otherwise, we need to start as the baseline at that 188 million.

Before we proceed with is it possible, I think we need to look at this scoring sheet and really understand why it's ranked number nine and not higher, given all of the public feedback that we've received specifically on this corridor.

So all of those interstate projects all fall mostly above those -- the other projects for two reasons. One is the amount of traffic. Two is because of the federal funding that is involved in all of the interstates, because of the, one, condition requirements that are on those interstates, as well as they are -- they are all federally mandated. So the only ones that aren't, US-60 is on the -- not only is it a -- those are US routes that are -- also have a higher priority on federal funding, and then SR-64, the only reason that that one falls above 347 is because of its condition and because of its -- it's pretty much the same criteria falling in on 347, multiple. Needs a widening and its current condition. All the projects above 347, that's the reason why they're above SR-347.

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: So a lot of them are funding, a component of funding. Where -- which column is the traffic column or the vehicles traveled column? That's...

MR. BYRES: So that follows -- that -- whether or not it can improve congestion and the congestion rank is -- we go by congestion, not necessarily by volume.

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Okay. So improve congestion

score.

MR. BYRES: Yes.

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: And I know we had that great presentation on this document, but I hadn't seen the document yet at the presentation. So now I want to go back and maybe have another conversation about that, because I'd like to understand sort of the breakdown of how that occurs, and does it account for growth, and does it account for age of -- you know, there's, like, so many factors included in this ranking.

The federal funding totally makes sense to me.

We're in sort of one of those windows of federal funding that is more intense than others, and therefore, in order to take advantage of the federal funding, we've got to use state dollars to do our match. And so that makes sense to me as to why, you know, there would be an extensive number of projects utilizing those -- that federal funding, but there's so many other factors and components that I want to make sure that we really understand, particularly because we're being asked to vote on a five-year plan that ranks and utilizes this ranking in order to prioritize the funding. We better understand this ranking, I think, at a deeper level.

MR. BYRES: Understood.

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Any other questions from

board members?

Okay. I'm going to summarize real quick what we

1 heard. We have a funding deficit, and we also have an extensive
2 period of time with which this corridor will be under
3 construction. I'd like us to find ways or maybe look to -- look

4 for ways for us to, A, close the funding deficit, which it

5 appears as though that is at least in process. So problem

6 number one is closing the deficit, either through State --

7 additional State funding, getting these bills passed, which I

And then problem number two really is this sort of large window of time with which this corridor will be under construction, and I'd like for us to check with ADOT staff periodically to see if there's ways to shorten that window and to compress the schedule in order to ensure that these residents, Maricopa and those who are part of the traveling public, don't get stuck in construction messes for three years, which is what it sounds like right now.

Did I miss any key points from the rest of the

VICE CHAIR MAXWELL: And I know that's not a second, because we're taking no action, Madam Chair, but I would second Member Searle's motion if it was one.

But I think that's the biggest thing, is where we can find some compression of the projects, or at least not waiting for one after the next after the next. I just think we set ourselves up for failure.

I do appreciate the briefing of the staff and the update and, Madam Chair, I appreciate all the effort you're putting into making sure you understand how we prioritize, because I do think that's something a lot of times we take for granted.

MS. HOWARD: I, too, agree in totality with what both board members said, and I want to see this project in the five-year construction plan no matter what. I want to see whether we have to strategically phase it somehow to where the underfunded portion becomes a separate scope of work that we can search for funding for. That's just creativity, in a way. But again, I'm going to be pushing for these bills to pass. I'm

going to make calls. I'm going to send emails, do whatever I can.

We could look at other projects, maybe, that have possible other funding mechanisms we could keep an eye on, but again, we all need to remember that we as a board can make changes to this. I -- my understanding is we as a board can make changes to this plan any given time as well; is that correct?

MR. ROEHRICH: So, Madam Chair, Mrs. Howard, that is correct. We change the five-year program every month. As you know, as it comes through PPAC, we're constantly modifying it. You approve it in June of every year. So it kicks off July 1st as a point in time, and then as we continue to develop it and learn things, and if projects can be accelerated or if projects have to be deferred because we run into issues, we change it every month.

MS. HOWARD: Okay. Thank you.

So I'm hoping, worst case scenario, we can strategically, again, devise a scoping mechanism where we utilize the funds that we have and get whatever portion of the project we can in this plan, and then keep moving forward. I hope we don't have to get to that point. I hope we can find a way to get it in there. But again, I appreciate everybody's hard work on this, and I know many, many other people do as well. Thank you.

MS. PESHLAKAI: Madam Chair, this is Member Peshlakai. I just wanted to echo that I also think that by doing the first two projects, Mammoth Way and Riggs Road, would be a good idea, and then moving forward, we can -- just like our other members have noted that prioritization could be amped up in coming months.

And then, also, I just wanted to add that if GRIC had been in any way opposed or feeling like there was a different path, I think we would have heard from them by now. So I'm pretty confident that this would go -- it would be supported by the GRIC community and all those in that area of the Valley. Thank you, Madam Chair. (Speaking Native language.)

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you.

MS. HOWARD: Real quick, I want to add, when I said project, I meant the widening. I know everything else is pretty much a go if these bills passed, but I'm talking about the actual widening.

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Yeah. All of them will have an impact on the corridor, but I think the widening will have the greatest impact on the corridor, and therefore, feels like an important emphasis for the Board. So thank you for mentioning that, Board Member Howard.

You know, when you look at it, the SR-347, we deal with it on a daily basis, you know, and one of the things that I was listening to during this conversation is the scoring and the P2P ranking and things. And I brought up to you guys in our -- at your last meeting that safety is not given, I don't think, the proper weight when you talk about it, when you look at modernization.

For example, like, the composite score for modernization is 25 percent, but only 15 percent for expansion. So just those switches alone would put, I would think, the SR-347 widening project, which is what we're talking about, above most of the other ones in the five-year plan, so that the small switch would allow you guys to look at it that way.

You know, and then you talk about -- we talked about the safety that's there, you know, and the traffic, you know. 58,000 cars on a daily basis. In the last five years, 1,000 car accidents have happened there. Numerous serious, many fatal accidents. And what's happening there are rear-end collisions, a lot of them.

So when you look at what we're -- what we're facing here, the longer the period it takes to get this done, just -- it's going to just cause more and more backups, more and

This was incredibly important and informational, and I think I just took a lot of notes learning all these different aspects that, you know, I hadn't heard before. It's been really great to get this information. Thank you so much for taking the time to do this today. It really demonstrates a commitment from the Board, and it's really helpful for our community to see that.

I do want to clarify a few things that came up today. The first is that we are looking to provide that substantial local contribution. If we do the total between the City and the County is \$50 million, and that's because we would essentially be financing the County's portion of that through our own bonding so that we can write a check for the full 50 million to ADOT when the time is appropriate as determined by the Department, and that allows this to not be provided over time and not something that the Department has to bond against. We can do that ourselves. So it is a \$50 million total local contribution.

But I do want to be clear. This is intended --

that local contribution is intended for the widening of 347 within Pinal County. It is not intended to backfill the other projects, and that's really important to our residents, as we are having that open dialog with our community right now about how we would pay for this and what that process looks like. The intent is that that is for widening.

As Councilmember Manfredi mentioned, the safety and the congestion and all of the issues that our residents are facing on this road today make it a top priority for our community, and that's why we are looking at providing this information.

Again, thank you so much for this opportunity today. Thank you for getting into the guts of the P2P process also. Our ask of you is to reprioritize this and to look at the money that was presented a few months ago as potential contingency fund that could be available in Pinal County. Look at repurposing them towards this project as well. We believe we meet the criteria. We believe that this is a critical project, and it should be at the top of the list. Thank you so much again.

MR. ROEHRICH: Madam Chair, that is all the requests to speak that I received.

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Perfect. Thank you, everyone, for participating today, and a special thank you to ADOT staff for making this possible. We really appreciate it.

I do have some additional questions that I've sort of taken notes on that I'll be sending, Floyd, to you and the team, and I would encourage the rest of the board to do so on an individual basis to ensure that we all have the information that we need in order to make the best decision possible for our state. CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: We do have quite a few -- do you (inaudible)? We have quite a few requests to speak today on our call to the audience, so I will make a request that for those of you that can deliver your messages in two minutes or less, that would be great. It is agendized for three, so you have the ability to take the full allotment, but if you can summarize and/or support us in moving this board meeting a little bit more efficiently, we would very much appreciate it. It does not take away from your comments if you go for three minutes. We won't look less on your comments if you take the whole time.

So we'll start first with Mayor Joe Conrad, our Benson Mayor. Welcome. Thanks again for hosting us.

MAYOR CONRAD: Thank you.

Well, it's refreshing to address the dais from this side. Good morning, everyone. I do want to thank the Horseshoe Cafe for providing breakfast for us this morning, and I'm going to go ahead and use my two minutes.

Anyway, as Mayor of Benson, Arizona, it's my immense pleasure to welcome Chairperson Jenn Daniels, the esteemed ADOT Board of Directors and other distinguished guests to our city. Benson is honored to host this event and deeply appreciates your decision to use us as your venue for April 2025.

We hold ADOT in high regard as a long-standing and valued partner. Our city is uniquely positioned at the convergence of three major ADOT arteries, Interstate 10, Arizona, 90, Arizona 80, making critic- -- making Benson, a critical hub in the state's transportation network.

We also proudly operate the Benson Municipal Airport, Paul Kerchum Field, which stands as a testament to our commitment to fostering growth and connectivity. Historic Highway 80, locally known as Fourth Street, serves as the main artery of Benson.

I'm pleased to share that downtown Benson is undergoing a significant revitalization. Our downtown businesses are dedicated to infusing new life into our historic city, and we hope to collaborate with ADOT to facilitate further improvements and growth in this area.

I must acknowledge ADOT's current presence and commend your efforts on I-10, State Route 90 to State Route 80 Climbing Lane Extension Project. Your support has been invaluable, notably in assisting with the installation of our new Purple Heart sign on State Route 80 at the southern entrance to the City. This partnership has helped us enhance the welcoming spirit of Benson, especially for our veterans, and for that we are truly grateful.

However, I must take this opportunity to express our concerns regarding the frequent accidents occurring between

Milemarker 301 and 306 on Interstate 10. These incidents often result in highway closures, placing our first responders, Benson Police and Benson Fire, at significant risk. These dedicated individuals are the first to arrive on the scene, and their invaluable service often diverts them from their primary mission of safeguarding our city. We would be keen to discuss this matter further and offer our assistance to mitigate the hazards causing these accidents.

Another focus for our city council is the Benson Municipal Airport. We envision the airport as a potential commerce center and would welcome any funding opportunities from ADOT to support this vision. Your partnership in this endeavor would be instrumental in transforming into a thrive -- our airport into a thriving hub of economic activity.

I wish to extend an invitation to everyone to please come back and visit Benson at any time to experience some of our rich history. This includes railroad history and the Butterfield Trail, which both helped to lay the foundation of a transportation hub.

I would be remiss if I did not also extend an invitation for all to attend our Eighth Annual Lantern Festival that would be held on Saturday, September 20th, on the San Pedro Golf Course.

In closing, I extend my heartfelt thanks to ADOT Board of Directors and our distinguished guests for your

presence here today. We look forward to continuing our collaborative efforts and achieving great strides together. Benson is committed to working alongside ADOT to ensure the prosperity and safety of our community. Thank you.

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you, Mayor.

Mayor Nancy Smith is up next, and we'll have Kathleen Gomez on deck.

MAYOR SMITH: Hi. Thank you very much, and thank you for the privilege of speaking here today. As you know, I've had the privilege many times to speak in many cities with you, in front of you, discussing 347 all the while, and Benson is no different in terms of what a lovely city it is, and they've been great. Mayor Conrad took care of us and telling us where to eat and where to stay, and it's been a lovely experience so far.

As I indicated, this is the last time that I have the privilege of speaking publicly with you before our May meeting -- your May meeting, and the five-year plan is available after public comment. I believe your public comments will be hugely dominated by the tremendous outcry of Maricopa citizens who are extremely frustrated with years of patiently waiting for the State and the ADOT system and process to understand the needs for having State Route 347 project fully funded in the five-year plan.

The City has been a great partner. Just to remind you, taking 30 lane miles off of ADOT books, saving them

money, requesting and receiving funding for the State -- from the State for the overpass and the intersections, contributing funds to the study, to projects within the city limits, preparing our federal legislators for a grant request when the design is complete, asking Pinal County to contribute, working with MAG for Maricopa County portion of the funding, asking you, the Board, to understand the flaws in the ranking process that doesn't consider growth, huge growth in the case of the city of Maricopa, safety, huge safety problems for us, trucking, economic development needs within our city, and employees traveling to their jobs and families who are left without their parents while they're stuck on 347.

I ask myself, and I ask you, what more can I do? What more can I say? But I can tell you that we, the city council, can be bold and consider a half cent sales tax to increase even more than we've already contributed to this project. We held our first open house last week for this initiative, and after asking many questions, those in attendance believe this was our only hope, and so we have two more of those open houses. One tomorrow. We invite you to attend if you're able to do that. Listen to our residents. Hear what they have to say. Hear the questions.

We the city council vote on this in just a couple weeks before your next meeting, and we can be bold, and so I hope that you will see that as a result. We can't continue to

ignore this problem. Let me share with you DPS couldn't
continue to ignore this problem. They've recently authorized 17
extra shifts on State Route 347, and in that time frame, in
March and they continue in April, 220 traffic stops. 195 were
hazardous citations. That's what happens in one month on 347.
14 restraint citations, 36 other citations. 91 percent of the
stops resulted in a citation.

I gave you this picture just in closing, and this says it all. I mean, who puts a bumper sticker on their window that says "Don't go to Heaven on Highway 347"? This is serious business. We're talking lives. We ask you to be bold. Thank you.

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you, Mayor.

Kathleen Gomez, and on deck will be Jose
Grijalva.

SUPERVISOR GOMEZ: Thank you very much for having me here. I understand your dilemma, as I just sat through probably 20, 30 meetings, hearing all the different departments asking for money for, you know, Cochise County. But let me tell you, I'm a fourth generation from Douglas, Arizona. It is an incredible place. In the '60s, it was the third largest city in Arizona. My father, when he was mayor of Douglas, worked on this port of entry. In fact, in Douglas, it's kind of an urban legend, because we've been told it's going to happen in 2008, 2014, 2018, 2024, and now possibly 2028. Actually, Douglas has

been forgotten. You know, when the mines closed, we didn't have the leadership to actually bring in any kind of industry. So we were relying on just ourselves.

This port of entry is crucial in so many ways to the economic growth of Arizona. Douglas pretty much is relying on federal -- I think 60 to 70 percent of them are on AHCCCS. We are relying on federal handouts. We need jobs. We need economic development.

With Frank Antenori and myself as new members of the Cochise County Board of Supervisors, we have a master plan of economic development for 191, an economic corridor. We are looking at medical tourism. I'm dedicated to building a hospital in Douglas as (indiscernible) a mental health institute. 66 percent of the people in jail are mentally ill. It costs \$100,000 per person to take them to Phoenix, or 36,000 per day to Tucson.

If we can have this port of entry, we can bring economic development to an area that has been forgotten, and these are the kind of things that I know that you've heard, but I want to repeat. We can enhance cross-border trade efficiency, leverage federal investment and border modernization. We can support legal international trade growth. We can maximize utility of the Bisbee-Douglas International Airport, which we're now looking also for a \$9 million grant to make those runways, you know, durable, so that we can have large jets land on them.

We have such an -- it's an incredible economic 1 2 opportunity. I get very excited, because we're on a precipice. 3 If it doesn't happen now, I don't know when it will. We have the cattle, people who are bringing cattle into the United 4 States, working with feed lots, working -- I mean, it's all 5 6 there. We need this port of entry to bring it together, but you 7 can't have a \$400 million port if you don't have a road to 8 connect it from the border to 80, and that's what we need. 9 We need to see actually the money there so that 10 everyone can start investing and making a master plan, whether 11 it's the hospital, whether it's economic growth, bringing in the 12 cattle, bringing in all the different minerals that are going to 13 be coming from Sonora. I know the mayor is going to come and 14 tell you what he's planning to do. We have been -- this is like 15 an urban legend in Douglas when you talk about the port of 16 entry. It's been at least 40 years. 17 Please help us in being able to be really 18 productive, to grow Arizona in ways in which I don't think 19 anyone really oversees. Thank you for the opportunity. Please 20 think about us. Thank you. 21 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you, Supervisor Gomez. 22 And I apologize for not using your title earlier. (Inaudible.) 23 Jose Grijalva, please, and Katy Proctor will be on deck. 24 25 MAYOR GRIJALVA: Good luck following that up.

Good morning, Chair Daniels, Vice Chair Maxwell, and members of the State Transportation Board. For the record, my name is Jose Grijalva, and I'm the Mayor of the City of Douglas.

I'm here to provide an update on the progress of the Douglas two-port solution and connector road that will serve as the new port. I wanted to inform you that when we started down this plan, the federal government had committed 400 million in funding to undertake both projects, 216 million for the new port, and 184 million for the Raul Castro facilities. GSA has recently updated project costs to more than \$653 million, with 313 million for the new port, and 350.5 million for the existing port. I think you will agree these investments are unprecedented, and we must do whatever it takes to get them done.

We continue to work with our key partners, including Cochise County and ADOT to address critical related infrastructure projects necessary for the new port, including a utility corridor for water, sewer, electric, broadband and natural gas. But the reason I'm here before you today is for the new connector road from the new port of entry to SR-80. ADOT's technical team has confirmed that this project will cost 43.3 million, and that they have in hand 27.5 million for the project. We worked with the Legislature also and secured 8.6 million in fiscal year 2023 to help pay for the project. We

continue with our Congressional delegation, and are once again putting forward a Congressional-directed spending request for 20 million to cover the outstanding balance.

During the last study session, it was mentioned that there are projects in our region that could be delayed to ensure that the complete funding for the connector road is in the bank. If I recall correctly, it was Mr. Searle that suggested that a bridge improvement project on US-191 could be delayed, and that would allow the Board to move on the funding to the connector road project. Without the road, we fear that it's not going to get done. It might get delayed by the federal government.

I'd like to at least publicly say that this isn't going to be an empty investment. Next week I'm meeting with the cities in Mexico. Our sister city, Agua Prieta. I'm inviting Hermosillo. I'm inviting Nacozari. I'm inviting Guaymas, Cananea, and others to sign sister city agreements that this is going to be the preliminary meeting to then push trade jobs over here, from Mexico to Douglas, and then have us be really the hub where it all -- where it all starts.

I know we've all heard of the term "trickle down economics," but with Douglas, I feel like we're going to be trickling up. It's going to start in Douglas. It's going to benefit Douglas, but also Cochise County, and not only Cochise County, but Maricopa County, Phoenix area. Let us -- let us be

the start to this new -- this new age, especially with this new port that's going to be the most modernized, with cold storage, you know, with the room temperature that are going to have the produce stay in great condition.

So we're looking to be the catalyst in that, and with your support, we'll not only help grow Douglas, but Cochise County and the whole state of Arizona to be competitive with the whole nation and the United States. Thank you for your time and your support.

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you, Mayor.

11 | Appreciate your words.

Katy Proctor is up, with Priscilla Behnke on deck.

MS. PROCTOR: Good morning, Madam Chair, Members. My name is Katy Proctor, and I'm here on behalf of the City of Maricopa. I want to thank you again for all of your work on the study session last week. That was a really great opportunity for us to hear some new data, and I do want to reiterate a couple things that did come up during that conversation.

As you heard from the Mayor, we are looking at that local contribution in concert with Pinal County. The total amount is \$50 million. Pending the vote next month from our city council, we would be very happy to enter into a JPA on that or IGA as soon as possible, and we can provide that full lump sum amount next calendar year for ADOT to get started on the

project.

I do want to just note that -- a couple things. It is intended only for the widening component of that, and this is in concert with the conversations that were happening in our community right now, with our residents about their intent, and also with our city and council's intent.

And then I also do need to mention that I cannot commit a future city council either. So we really hope that the timing works out well for this to be something that happens now, because this is a great opportunity for everybody.

I hope, over the last few months, we've really demonstrated for you why this project is so critical to our community and to the region in general. I think P2P is a wonderful process with a lot of value, but it's not infallible. There are aspects of that data that do not fully describe the situation we are facing right now, and if safety was a larger factor, if the district score was a higher factor, if we had a more modern approach to the economic development component and more emphasis on actual traffic count, we would be at the top of the list.

You also have board policies right now that give you precedent for giving preference for processes that have projects -- excuse me -- that have a local match, and that's been done before, and I think there's a reason for that.

I also want to mention the obvious. There is a

public comment component of this process, and I think the public comment has been very clear. You've heard from our residents and from the community over the last two years as you've gone through the board process for the program. You've heard from our residents as they come to see you here at these meetings and send emails. And last year, when ADOT conducted the project meeting in our community, it was so well attended that they had to call an audible and do two presentations that night, because the place was packed.

The public wants this project. It is necessary for our community. I do not envy the position that you are in, because this is difficult decisions, and there isn't enough money for everything, and I completely understand that, but I do believe that the discretion you are afforded in your roles here is intentional and purposeful, because sometimes there are projects and there are times that just need to move forward, and this is one of those times. There's a financial incentive on the table, the data is clear, and the public has spoken. Please, please prioritize this project this year. Thank you.

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you, Katy.

Priscilla, and then Vincent Manfredi on deck.

MS. BEHNKE: Good morning, members of the Board.

My name is Priscilla Behnke, and I am the co-founder and executive director of Be Awesome, a nonprofit based in the heart of Maricopa.

1 Every day, I work with youth and families 2 striving to build and -- build lives filled with connection, confidence, and contribution, but every day, we also lose 3 4 something invaluable, time, on a road that can no longer or they can no longer carry the weight of our city's growth. The SR-347 5 isn't just a highway. It's a lifeline, and now it's failing 6 7 people who depend on it most. Parents trying to get home in time for dinner, teens missing opportunities to be mentored and 8 9 involved, and young children losing out on critical moments with 10 their families at dinner. 11 We cannot afford to wait any longer. The people 12 of Maricopa have shown up. We've supported studies. We've 13 passed measures and raised our voices. Our city leaders have 14 stepped up with funding and a vision for growth, and now we're 15 asking you to meet us at this moment of urgency and momentum in 16 placing SR-347 on a five-year construction plan. This isn't 17 just about easing traffic. It's about protecting lives, 18 restoring hours lost to communities, and giving our families a 19 fighting chance at a future they deserve. 20 We're not asking for a handout. We're asking for 21 a partnership, and Maricopa is ready to do its part. Please 22 help us move forward. 23 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you very much,

Vincent, and Brandi Helman will be on deck.

MR. MANFREDI: Chair, Board, thank you so much for allowing us to speak. You know, giving us this opportunity is always, you know -- we're always thankful for it. I'll keep this very short, because everybody speaks much more eloquently than I ever could.

But the reality is, the City of Maricopa is looking to partner with ADOT, looking to partner with the State and get this done. I don't know if it's true or not, but I do know that there's not many cities out there who are contributing money to a project outside of the city boundaries, outside of the city land on state roads that are looking to be expanded. The City of Maricopa is doing that. The people of Maricopa are stepping up.

And as you notice, it's not just elected officials that come to this meeting or city leaders. It's everybody. We don't -- the people of Maricopa don't drive to this meeting two and a half hours each way, spending five minutes to do two minutes at a podium for the heck of it, right? We don't do it because we have nothing better to do. We do it because it's the most important thing for the city of Maricopa to do is to get out, speak to you and let you know how important this is. So I'm going to do something that not many people do, is I'm going to give you back your time. Instead of three minutes, I think I'm at about a minute and 10 seconds. Thank you so much. Please make sure the SR-347 expansion project is

1	on the five-year plan. Thank you.
2	CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you.
3	Brandi, and followed by Brandi, we will have a
4	representative for Sarah Ogilvie.
5	MS. HELMAN: Good morning, members of the Board.
6	My name is Brandi Helman, and I'm the co-founder of Be Awesome
7	in the city of Maricopa, but today I'm speaking to you not as a
8	nonprofit leader, but as a mom.
9	For seven years, I drove SR-347 twice a day so
10	that my son could attend a school that gave him the best shot at
11	a bright future. There are days that we missed school
12	altogether because of crashes, days we didn't make it home for
13	dinner. My daughter missed out on extracurriculars, not for
14	lack of interest or effort, but because the road that connects
15	us to the opportunity was failing us.
16	Even now, as I work with kids and their families,
17	I watch parents show up late, anxious and apologetic because
18	they were stranded on the 347. This road is costing us more
19	WEBEX: This meeting is being recorded.
20	MS. HELMAN: Oops. Sorry.
21	CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: I think we might be having a
22	technical difficulty.
23	MS. HELMAN: Oh, okay.
24	(Inaudible conversation.)
25	MR. ROEHRICH: You can continue. We are

1 recording with the audio. 2 MS. HELMAN: Okay. MR. ROEHRICH: If you want, Madam Chair. 3 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Okay. Thank you. 4 5 MS. HELMAN: All right. Even now, as I work with 6 kids and their families, I watch parents show up late, anxious 7 and apologetic because we -- they are stranded on the 347. This 8 road is costing us more than time. It's costing kids their 9 chance to thrive. You have the power to change that. Please 10 put the SR-347 in the five-year construction plan. It's more 11 than a road, a project. It's a lifeline for families like mine. 12 I do want to add one more thing. My daughter 13 goes to NAU, and she's actually more terrified and anxious to 14 drive the 347 than the 17. Just putting that out there. Thank 15 you. 16 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you. 17 And we'll look to Richard Searle as the representative for Sarah. 18 19 MR. SEARLE: Good morning. This is a little bit 20 different, but, you know, you're in my town, so... 21 My daughter and her family live here in Benson, 22 and I will grant Maricopa that the 347 comes up more than the 23 issue that my daughter brings up to me, but she hits a close 24 second. She has two daughters that go to school here at Benson, 25 and there is a need for a turning signal at the light at

1 Patagonia and Highway 80, or Fourth Street. And she's talked to 2 Brad Hamilton many times, and Brad told her that, you know, this is not a City of Benson issue. That light belongs to ADOT. And 3 4 I understand that --The meeting is being recorded. 5 WEBEX: 6 MR. SEARLE: -- a light probably does not meet 7 the requirements 20 hours of the day, but there are at least two 8 or three hours every day when school starts and ends that it is 9 an issue for a protected turning light on Fourth and Highway 10 80 -- Fourth and Patagonia. 11 So she could not make it today. She was going to 12 come and speak. You know, that would have been kind of cool to 13 have my daughter speak in call to the public, but anyhow, just 14 for the knowledge and the record, there is a request for a 15 protected turning light. And I wish (inaudible) had been here, 16 and Greg, hopefully you can pass it on. I would appreciate it. 17 Thank you. 18 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you, Board Member 19 Searle, acting as father of Sarah today, the most important 20 role. 21 Bill Robertson, and then after Bill, we'll go to 22 our online guests if there's no one else. 23 MR. ROBERTSON: Straighten out my mess here. 24 Thank you, Madam Chair and Board Members. Thank 25 you for the opportunity.

I just wonder, do you feel like you're being stalked by Maricopa? We seem to be following you everywhere, but it is our pleasure to address you once again.

The five-year plan is the most important first step. Without the five-year plan, nothing can happen. All the work that we put in, all the work that you put in, all the work that our city council puts in and our citizens is for naught if we don't make it in the five-year plan. We understand how the five-year plan works. It's tentative almost all the time, because it's reviewed annually, and it can be changed and things can be added, but that's the first, most significant step. If we miss the inclusion of 347 in the next five-year plan, that equates to dozens of more deaths and untold injuries and disabilities. We know that it's all about planning. I serve as -- on the Planning and Zoning Commission, so planning is a big deal to me, and this is part of the planning process, getting it into the five-year plan.

The city of Maricopa residents overwhelmingly support us nickling up our funds to this overall plan to get this funded. If it's not in the plan, nothing happens. This weekend is about to be a nightmare in the city of Maricopa. Interstate 10 is closing tonight at midnight, eastbound at Riggs Road for the entire weekend. That shifts 70 -- what was the number -- 75,000 vehicles every few hours over to SR-347, into the heart of Maricopa, and then down through Casa Grande or out

1	to Interstate 8, south of Maricopa. It's about to be a
2	nightmare. This happens more frequently. This is a big one,
3	because it's construction related to the Gila River Bridge
4	expansion on Interstate 10, but it also happens every time
5	there's a crash on Interstate 10. We're impacted. Now, we
6	enjoy the gross receipt tax that comes from that and the sales
7	tax we when everybody stops for a Coke or a bag of ice.
8	But all kidding aside, without getting in the
9	five-year plan, we have no hope, so we encourage you once again
10	to seriously consider at least getting us in the five-year plan,
11	make that first necessary step so we do have a lifeline to the
12	final decision and planning, design and construction of SR-347.
13	Thank you very much.
14	CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you, Bill.
15	All right. We'll move to our online guests.
16	Bryce, if you can assist. The first is Marcia DeSalvo, if you
17	could raise your hand, and then on deck will be Sharon Walker.
18	WEBEX HOST: You're now unmuted.
19	MS. DESALVO: Can you hear me now?
20	CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Yes, we can.
21	MS. DESALVO: Am I unmuted? I'm sorry.
22	CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Marcia, you sound great. Go
23	ahead and speak.
24	MS. DESALVO: Okay. Sorry about that.
25	CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: You're good.

MS. DESALVO: Okay. Well, thank you so much for allowing me to speak to all of you today. I would like to let you know that I've reviewed the Tentative Five-Year Transportation Facilities Construction Program that you posted for 2026 and 2030, and my concern, I'm a Goodyear resident in the community of Pebble Creek, and my concern is the SR-303 increasing noise on the highway. I've seen a number of projects in the master that involve Route 303 in or near Goodyear, but I could not tell if any of them would address a possible noise mitigation wall.

I'd like to inquire if a noise study and then possibly noise mitigation wall was possible, because the 303, where it borders Pebble Creek, specific to Unit 57 within the development. I do know that based on the modeling at the time that the community was developed, a standard six foot high privacy wall was required by DOT. It said it would adequately shield the planned residential homes from the interim Loop 303 roadway. This assumes the privacy wall is constructed of six-inch or eight-inch thick block rather than the thinner four-inch block, but there was no height requirement.

And as the warehouses have grown and the traffic has grown on Route 303, the peaceful enjoyment of the neighborhood has been eroded. You can hear the noise whipping around inside the house as well as outside in this whole, entire area, and I was just hoping that there are some plans for a

1 noise study, because from what I understand, the last noise 2 study was done in 2010, and obviously, we can all agree that 15 3 years is -- there's been substantial growth within that time. 4 And so I would respectfully ask that that become part of that 5 plan. Thank you very much. 6 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you, Marcia. 7 We'll have Sharon Walker. Please raise your 8 hand, and Kimberly Daniels is on deck. No relation. 9 WEBEX HOST: You are now unmuted. You may speak. 10 MS. WALKER: Good morning, Madam Chair, Board 11 Members, and everyone in attendance at this meeting this 12 morning. I'm Sharon Walker. I'm a citizen here in Maricopa. 13 First, just let me say Benson sounds like a 14 beautiful town. I wish I could have been there in person to 15 witness that, but getting on to today's business. You've heard 16 from officials in our city, our mayor, Mayor Smith, and several 17 citizens of Maricopa all expressing in our concerns regarding 18 the issues on State Route 347. We have addresses the Board 19 (audio interruption) and we will continue to do so to highlight 20 the importance of including State Route 347 and the 21 infrastructure issues in your five-year plan. 22 I would like to just reinforce what everybody has 23 said today. The facts and figures and information that has been 24 provided to you, and kindly request that you consider our 25 requests and concerns to partner with ADOT board with regard to

fixing our issues on 347 and including it in the five-year plan. It's very important to the citizens of Maricopa with our daily lives, and it's also very important to the city of Maricopa with the sustainability and to the growth of our city, because it is a very important city in the state of Arizona.

Thank you for your time and consideration to our request and information that has been provided to you this morning. Again, thank you for your attention to this matter, and kindly urge you, respectfully, to include infrastructure improvements, funding and everything that is needed to address the 347 in your five-year plan. Thank you.

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you, Sharon.

Kimberly Daniels, you're up now, and Kate Morley is on deck.

WEBEX HOST: You are now unmuted. You may speak.

MS. DANIELS: My name is Kimberly Daniels, and I'm a college student who calls Maricopa home. My family has had very deep roots here for a long time, and I watched my dad spend years commuting on the 347 until he was finally able to find a good job locally. Now, as I'm building my own future, I would like to start my own family here, but I wonder if I and many others will be forced to leave because the road won't change and because critical improvements keep getting delayed.

State Route 347, has become a significant barrier for many families in our community, with parents often delayed

1 or stuck in traffic along this route. Children are frequently 2 left home alone or placed in extended after school care, which 3 can create unnecessary risks and stress for families. I'm part 4 of these after school programs, and I have seen it myself. 5 These kids get stuck here, and both parents or one of them are 6 stuck on the 347 and unable to come and get their children. 7 Maricopa families deserve better. They deserve the opportunity 8 to spend meaningful time together, and they deserve the chance 9 to stay in Maricopa and thrive there. 10 Improving the SR-347 is not just a matter of 11 transportation. It's a matter of family, well-being and 12 community stability. Please help make that a possibility by 13 including the SR-347 in the five-year construction plan. Thank 14 you. 15 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you, Kimberly. 16 Kate Morley, you're up, and Christian Milek 17 (phonetic) will be on deck. 18 WEBEX HOST: You are now unmuted. You may speak. 19 MS. MORLEY: -- the Board. Kate Morley, the executive director of MetroPlan in the greater Flagstaff region. 20 21 I'm speaking today just to give you a little 22 background on deferring the light upgrade in the greater 23 Flagstaff region. I really want to thank staff, because what 24 you may not realize is not only are they upgrading to LED 25 lights, but they've been working closely with the astronomy

community to make sure those are amber LED lights, which are dark skies friendly.

As the Board knows, we have investments in the greater Flagstaff region, such as Lowell Observatory, the Discovery Telescope, but most importantly, the Naval Observatory, which is critical to national security interests, and the Naval Observatory does have concerns about LED lights that are not amber. So we wanted to recognize staff for working with them through that process.

We also wanted the Board to be aware that we have actually submitted a request to ADOT to change the standards in Coconino County to always use amber LED lights when LED lights are being installed. Staff have said that they want to study these new lights before they commit to that, which we understand. We want to make sure staff know that there are many experts in the region who are offering their assistance to help that have studied lights before, and it's not an effort that needs to be started from scratch. We're also unsure if that study is funded at this point, and if it's not funded, we really urge the funding for that to be included so that we can move forward with that request.

So in wrapping up, we really hope that this delay is minor. We understand the lights broke. We hope that this doesn't kick it out a whole year and that it's really just a matter of months, and really want to thank staff for working

1 with us on the dark sky components. Thank you. 2 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you, Kate. 3 Christian Milek, you're up, and Tammy Wile (phonetic) will be on deck. 4 5 WEBEX HOST: We do have a call-in user, so I'm assuming that that is the person, if you are calling in -- oh, 6 7 you're now muted. 8 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Christian, are you 9 available? 10 MR. ROEHRICH: Somehow they muted themselves, 11 Bryce. Can you send them another unmute? 12 MR. MILEK: Hello. Sorry. Can you guys hear me? 13 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: We can now. Thank you, 14 Christian. Proceed. 15 MR. MILEK: Thank you. 16 Hello, members of the Board. My name is 17 Christian Milek, and I am currently a student at Northern 18 Arizona University, studying to become a doctor. I also work 19 with Be Awesome during school breaks and part-time while I'm in 20 class. 21 Growing up in Maricopa, avoiding the 347 has 22 always just been a part of life. We planned everything, 23 including school, sports, work, all around when the road might be clear. Friends and family, we route their entire lives just 24 25 to bypass it, and now I'm watching my younger brother grow up in

1 the same reality, with fewer options, fewer opportunities, and 2 more frustration. Our generation inherited this problem, and 3 we're wondering, will we be the ones who finally see it fixed, or will we continue to experience the delays, further problems 4 5 those delays cause. 6 We're not asking for perfection. We're asking 7 for progress. Please put SR-347, on the five-year construction 8 plan. It's time to do better for the future of Maricopa. Thank 9 you for your time. 10 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you, Christian. 11 And last but not least, Tammy Wile. 12 Bryce, it looks -- yeah. And can MR. ROEHRICH: 13 you unmute that other caller, User 5, I think it says? 14 WEBEX HOST: I have requested to unmute the line. 15 If you are calling in, please press star 6 to unmute. 16 MS. WILE: Sorry about that. 17 Good morning, Madam Chairman and members of the 18 Sorry about that confusion on unmuting. Board. 19 My name is Tammy Wile, and I'm with Pinal County, 20 and I'm here today to share with you some good news that we have 21 received recently from the Federal Aviation Administration. 22 Many of you will recall from our helicopter tour 23 last March, where we went up in the Black Hawk, that there was a pretty dramatic need for an air traffic control tower at Pinal 24 25 Airport, which is to remind you, it's also jointly operated as

1 the Silverbell Heliport for the Arizona National Guard, and we 2 got the good news last week that we have passed a pretty 3 significant hurdle, and we've been accepted into the tower 4 program by the FAA. 5 And so I wanted to circle back with all of you, 6 because we had discussed that on the helicopter tour and share 7 this kind of moment of celebration with you that that's well 8 underway. We're now on the clock, where we have seven years for 9 the design and conception. So that was it, and thank you very 10 much for having me. 11 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you, Tammy. I'm sure 12 that's due in part to a lot of hard work on your end, so 13 congratulations. 14 That concludes our communications from citizens, 15 unless there's anybody that submitted late. 16 MR. ROEHRICH: Madam Chair, I have not received 17 any other requests. 18 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you. 19 We will move to Agenda Item 1, our director's 20 report, and regret that Director Toth is unable to join us 21 She has an excused absence for sure. She's tending to today. 22 family. 23 So Floyd, would you mind presenting on her 24 behalf? 25 MR. ROEHRICH: Yes, Madam Chair, and I'll be very quick, because we do have a legislative update, and Amy will provide that.

Just a few things she wanted to point out. This month, April 15th, was the *Arizona Highways* magazine's 100th anniversary. The Governor did make a milestone proclamation on that day. There was a little ceremony with that, but she wanted to just express appreciation for all the hard -- people, the publishers and editors and everybody who's worked on that magazine for over 100 years to make such an outstanding gem of a publication that really supports Arizona, Arizona tourism, and just gets this great state's recognition.

Our current publisher, Kelly Mero and editor Robert Stevie were at the ceremony, and they are the current leaders that are just doing a fantastic job continuing the legacy and the quality of that magazine.

We did get notice that the State Route 88 project, the project that a lot of you were involved with here with the Board and programming that funds, that did receive a Nationwide Collaborative Project of the Year award. That team will be recognized later this year, but she wanted to give a congratulations to the whole team, everybody who came together to work hard to get that project open.

And then their safety message again this month is -- this month is a motorcycle safety, so please be careful when you're out. Remember to look in your blind spots for

Are you unmuted? 6 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Floyd, we can come back to 7 Amy. 8 MR. ROEHRICH: Yeah. I think we --9 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: That might be easier. 10 MR. ROEHRICH: Yeah. I don't see any audio 11 there. So yes, ma'am. 12 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: I do want to make sure we 13 hear her report. It is the height of the legislative session. 14 There's a lot going on. 15 MS. LOVE: Can you hear me now? 16 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Oh, yes. We can. Proceed. 17 MS. LOVE: Okay. Wonderful. Thank you, Madam 18 Chair. 19 So we can move to the first slide (inaudible). 20 Just to echo what Floyd said, I actually want to 21 thank Chairwoman Daniels for joining us. It was a wonderful day 22 celebrating the 100th anniversary with Governor Hobbs. I don't 23 know who smiled bigger, if it was Kelly or the Governor. 24 she saw the cake, she actually ran out of the room to get her 25 magazine so she could come back and have a picture with it.

So big thanks to Kelly and editor Robert Stevie, and then they were also then invited to the House floor, where Representative Betty Villegas and the House Transportation Chair, Representative Biasiucci, presented them with a proclamation from the State House, and wanted to thank Senator Kevin Payne for his introduction of an identical Senate resolution as well. So great day for the magazine, and appreciate you being there with us to celebrate, Chairwoman Daniels.

Next slide, please.

So last month, when we were here, there had only been three bills making their way to the Governor's desk, but as you'll see here, there have now been 144 bills passed. She has signed 19 of them -- I'm sorry -- vetoed 19 of them and signed 54. Several resolutions have passed, and 16 of them have been -- or introduced, and 16 have passed.

Next slide, please.

So this week, you know, typically, I think we've mentioned the deadline to hear bills in (inaudible) committees. It was at the end of March. There were some exceptions. The appropriations committees continue to meet for one additional week, and then this week, on Tuesday, the House and Senate Appropriations met separately, although they were not focused on any transportation specific issues. They were rather focused on hearing a bill related to funding for Developmental Disabilities

and some additional funding for that program.

The next day, on the 16th, the Governor did announce a bill moratorium, indicating that any bill that is sent to her prior to a full, clean supplemental appropriation for the bill heard in that committee will likely be her veto stamp, and we'll talk about a little -- a little bit about that and some bills in a minute.

And then on Thursday, the Finance Advisory

Committee met, this was yesterday, and largely they were focused on how much the state forecast has changed since January. The JLBC chair noted that there's a lot of uncertainty right now, making it difficult to forecast. They know that their current estimate is the available resources since January, when they were estimating around 612 million, has now been estimated to be reduced to approximately 277 million in available resources.

There were some modeling done potentially in terms of a recession, but nobody on the committee seemed to think that we were quite there yet.

Next slide, please.

Just one key date ahead. Tuesday, coming up, is theoretically the 100th day of the legislative session, at which time they would theoretically be done with their work for the year. However, I don't believe they will be reaching that deadline this year (inaudible) anticipate that the continued budget negotiations and conversations will go on probably well

1 into May.

2 Next slide.

Just moving on to a couple of bills that we have been -- talked about before in the past, but just bringing them back up to re-highlight. Neither of these bills were advanced through committee this year. However, just one note. The HB 2101, related to the SMART fund, that appropriated 10 million, just a reminder, in the initial Governor's budget that was introduced in January, she had indicated a \$13 million appropriation for AZ SMART. So even though this bill didn't move, we'll still keep an eye on the budget to see what the total amount, if any, ends up going to the AZ SMART fund for rural transportation improvements.

And then House Bill 2304, the RTAC annual bill for appropriation -- appropriations for rural (inaudible) and road projects. Although the bill did not hear -- receive a hearing and appropriations, the sponsor, Representative Biasiucci, held a special hearing and allowed folks who had projects within that bill to come and present and speak to the need for them. So that was a great opportunity to hear from Kevin and some of the other folks that had measures in there, and they were given the opportunity to present to the Transportation Committee and take questions.

The -- next slide, please.

The next bill, HB 2192, appropriates, 7 million

in this year and 50 million next year for the Interstate 10 between State Route 85 and Citrus Road. This bill has cleared all of the chambers, and like other appropriations measures, we anticipate this bill will likely not continue to move in its current form and will end up in the budget pile bill that will be negotiated between the Legislature and the Governor. So the bill did make it to both chambers and was passed unanimously, as has SB 1162, the appropriation highway project (inaudible).

I think we've mentioned this before. Most of the bills that had an appropriation attached to them were double assigned in committee, although 1162 was one of the few that was not, but all of the bills were typically double assigned and were heard in the House Transportation and Appropriations

Committee, as well as the Senate Transportation -- I'm sorry -- Senate Public Safety and Senate Appropriations Committee, and public safety was heard in the Senate, because there was not a transportation committee this year. However, that has changed, and next year, Senator Farnsworth will be (inaudible) a joint education and transportation committee. So we anticipate next year you will see bills completely through both House and Senate transportation committees as well as appropriations.

Next slide, please.

The other two bills that we were monitoring that related to transportation funding were related to the State Route 347. House Bill 2557 initially appropriated monies for

the SR-347 widening. That bill was amended in the Senate to now mirror SB 1617. So now both bills are identical, and they appropriate a net increase of 41.4 million from the General Fund (inaudible) the Riggs Road/347 TI. The bills will now appropriate monies in this year for design, right-of-way acquisition and utility relocation, and then additional monies in FY '27 remaining -- or (inaudible) 49 million in FY '28 to complete the construction.

Next slide, please.

And then there were a few other bills of interest that I wanted to raise for the Board that would potentially impact the five-year plan. The first one would be HB 2814. This would assert legislative authority for appropriating non-custodial federal dollars. This bill was unanin- -- it was passed out of the Senate this week and has been sent to the Governor. It was sent before she announced the bill moratorium. So I don't -- we haven't seen her take action on it yet, but it was sent up before the bill moratorium. So we'll see if she signs or vetoes that one.

And then Senate Bill 1086, Transportation System Performance ADOT. This bill essentially provides what would be included in the five-year plan, and when looking at it, the bullet points you see here are the items that would be eliminated and not being able to be included in the five-year plan. The big ones there being pavement and bridge projects.

1 And I believe those were all of the bills that I 2 had for you, but I'd be happy to answer any questions if the Board has any. 3 4 Next slide, please. VICE CHAIR MAXWELL: Just, please, if we go back 5 6 to that slide. And just clarification on SB 1086. 7 MS. LOVE: Yes. 8 VICE CHAIR MAXWELL: What exactly does that say, 9 and what exactly does that do, if it's passed? 10 MS. LOVE: Senate Bill 1086, and I'll pull it up 11 just so I -- it's not a very large bill -- it essentially 12 provides for three different buckets that would be included, and 13 I apologize. Off the top of my head, we were focused on what 14 would be impacted. But essentially, it's, I think, 40 percent 15 of funding -- it allocates 40, 40, and 20 percent of funding to 16 different transportation priorities, and it does not include 17 pavement, bridge. I apologize. (Inaudible.) 18 MR. ROEHRICH: So Amy, as you're trying to pull 19 it up, could you do a staff summary sheet, we can get it out to 20 all the board members that would look at what the impact of that 21 bill would be? 22 VICE CHAIR MAXWELL: I think that would probably 23 suffice. I just -- I can see what it says in the slide, but I 24 don't know that I fully understand how it would impact us on our 25 planning process.

MR. ROEHRICH: Especially on the programming process. Does it take the prioritization away from you and to tie it to a piece of legislation? That would be something I think the Board would really want to consider later.

MS. LOVE: Yeah. So it says the division shall develop for presentation to the Board standard transportation system performance factors that include at least the following, and the -- it says for highway projects, congestion reduction must be 40 percent, an increase in mobility 40 percent, and then safety improvements, including the reduction in the number of fatalities of the roadway at 20 percent, but I'd be happy to get a fact sheet out to the group.

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you, Amy.

MS. LOVE: You're welcome.

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Based on the sponsor,

Senator Hoffman, I would imagine it's -- errs on the side of
taking away authority from any other jurisdiction outside of the
Legislature. So I think we can just safely say that they're
taking back some power.

VICE CHAIR MAXWELL: Then, Madam Chair, I'd like to add, because I got the same question as you guys, who's controlling it. It also sounds like it's putting more towards new construction, which I fully understand, but as we know every year, 71 percent of what we do is just maintaining the system we've got. We can't -- so I think it's important that we learn

more about that, those of us who engage can engage.

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Perfect. Maybe we could get all of our 347 champions to also engage, a full crew.

All right. Amy, I do have one other question.

It's a question that --

MS. LOVE: Yes.

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: -- came up over the last week, and if we don't have an answer today, that's fine, but if you could present next month on it, and it would be the electric vehicle exemption that's set to expire, I think, in September of 2025 for HOV lanes, and whether you anticipate that there's some sort of Congressional extension or federal move that would do that, and if not, what our communications plan in Arizona would be to all drivers that that exemption may be maybe expiring. So I don't know if you have anything off the top of your head on that, Amy, or if you want to come back next month with some info on that one.

MS. LOVE: Certainly, Madam Chair, and I -Jenny, who is with our (inaudible), I know we've not heard of
any effort at the federal level to extend that. We've
certainly -- I know we've engaged already with the Department of
Public Safety, and our communications team has been doing a big
push to notify the public. I won't speak to all of their
efforts, but I know we have a pretty robust communication plan
that is included working and notifying, you know, motor vehicle

dealers so that they're letting folks know as they're purchasing
new electric vehicles that this moratorium is set to take effect
later this year, but we'd be happy to get you some more
information on that communication plan. So I know we have been
doing that, and there have been a number of news stories and
radio interviews about it as well. So we are actively engaging
and educating the public about that.

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you, Amy.

Board Member Elters?

MR. ELTERS: Thank you. Thank you, Madam Chair.

Amy, if you could also explain, is this taking place as a matter of just timeline, meaning the program calls for an expiration or a sunset in September, or is it because the HOV lane is saturated now? Is it a matter of traffic condition and the lane is fully being utilized or overutilized, as opposed to just a timeline that was set back when? My understanding all along, that this was a pilot program, and hybrid vehicle at one time, and they -- and all electric vehicles could use it. They stopped the hybrid vehicle blue plates issuance when the traffic volume in the HOV lane reached a certain point and the license plates had been all assigned. So I'm just curious as to what is bringing this termination of this program at this point. It looks like State Engineer Byres has an answer.

MR. ROEHRICH: Greg, can you turn that on? You have to push the button right on the top.

MR. BYRES: Is it on? It's red. 1 2 MR. ROEHRICH: Yeah. Red is on. 3 MR. BYRES: Okay. MR. ROEHRICH: That means you're live fire, 4 5 buddy. 6 MR. BYRES: There has always been a sunset date 7 in the ruling that came down from Federal Highway for the HOV limitations of single occupancy use for alternative fuel 8 9 vehicles. That's always been in there, and we've gone through 10 the entire process. The date has not changed, and it is now 11 approaching in September. Federal Highway has not indicated 12 that they will extend it, so therefore, we are anticipating that 13 termination date. 14 MR. ELTERS: Thank you. 15 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you. 16 Any other questions for Amy or the rest of the 17 team on legislative and Congressional guidance? 18 Okay. Moving on. There is no district report 19 this month, because we were just here in the district a few 20 months ago, and we'll be back here in October for the Rural 21 Transportation Summit, and also, our board meeting will be held 22 Sierra Vista. 23 So we will move on to the consent agenda. any member of the Board want to pull an item for consent -- from 24 25 consent to discuss, saying none we will entertain a motion?

1 Wait. Hold on one second. We're going to wait until Board Member... You're okay. We just want to make sure you get to 2 3 vote. MR. SEARLE: While you're waiting, I'll make a 4 5 motion to approve the consent agenda. MS. HOWARD: I'll second. 6 7 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you. 8 We have a motion and a second for the consent 9 agenda. All in favor, please say aye. 10 BOARD MEMBERS: Aye. 11 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Any opposed? 12 All right. That motion carries with a 6-0 vote. 13 Thank you. 14 We'll move on to the financial report, and 15 Kristine Ward was unable to attend today. All the information 16 is in our packet, so if you have any questions, I would 17 encourage you to reach out to Kristine, but I don't think we 18 actually need to go over the items as the standard report that 19 she's provided, and it is available to the public as well. 20 MR. ROEHRICH: Yes. Madam Chair, we will post 21 that information as well. There was nothing of significance. She didn't want me to remind everybody next 22 23 month, with the public hearing, she will come back with a more comprehensive report that shows the fiscal constraints of the 24 25 program to ensure that we are within federal compliance.

1 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you. 2 MR. SEARLE: All right. And Chair Daniels, just 3 a note. Reviewing her report, it does appear that her funding, 4 although is within the estimated range, it's on the low end of the estimated range, and it's kind of trending the wrong 5 6 direction, and I would just leave it at that. 7 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you, Board Member 8 Searle. 9 We'll move on to Agenda Item 5, our Multimodal Planning Division Report with Iqbal. 10 11 MR. ROEHRICH: Just need to turn that off, so I 12 push that. There you go. You're good. 13 MR. HOSSAIN: Good morning, Madam Chair and the 14 members of the Board. I hope you are all doing well this 15 morning. For the record, my name is Iqbal Hossain, the Deputy 16 Director of the Multimodal Planning Division. 17 Today, I will present Items 5A, 5B and Item 7. Ι 18 will begin with Item 5A, tribal transportation updates. 19 I would like to share an update on the SR-264 Corridor Planning Study. This study project was initiated 20 21 following feedback from Hopi tribal leaders and the State Transportation Board in 2022. Actually, there are two requests 22 23 in 2022. Their concerns were safety and the increased traffic volumes on SR-264. As a result, we started the project in 24 25 October of last year, and this study is looking at the

corridor's performance in terms of mobility, safety, and travel time reliability. We are about a third of the way through, and we are on track to wrap it up by end of 2025.

Great. A little update on tribal outreach. ADOT

MPD has issued a call for Project nominations under the planning and programming process for fiscal year 2027 to 2031.

Additionally, the call for projects for the Transportation

Alternative Programs, which is also open, and to ensure the outreach to our tribal partners, we reached out to all 22 tribes to notify them of these two programs.

Next, I want to follow up and on a question raised at the March meeting in Yuma regarding the Arizona Strategic Highway Safety Plan specifically, the tribal lands emphasis area.

Madam Chair, you had a question whether all 22 tribes in Arizona are eligible to participate in this emphasis area. The answer is yes, all federally-recognized tribal communities in Arizona are eligible to be involved in this emphasis area.

Last month, I reported that five tribes were actively engaged in this initiative, and today, I am happy to report that this month, the Salt River Pima Maricopa Indian Community joined to this emphasis area team to make it six, and we continue to invite and encourage additional tribal communities to join.

1 This concludes my presentation on tribal 2 transportation updates. 3 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you, Iqbal. 4 Any questions on (inaudible)? 5 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: All right. (Inaudible.) 6 MR. HOSSAIN: Thank you. 7 Then I'll move on to -- sorry. Then I'll move on 8 to Item 5B, public comment period for the Tentative Five-Year 9 Program update. Move on to... Okay. 10 I would like to provide an update on the public 11 comments we have received as of April 11 for the tentative 2026 12 through 2030 five-year program. As you know, the public 13 comments period opened on March 3rd and will continue until May 14 23rd. 15 (Inaudible conversation.) 16 MR. SEARLE: Perfect. Thank you. Thank you so 17 much. 18 So this slide demonstrates where we are in the 19 process of developing the five-year program. The public comment period continues on the 2026 through 2030 program, and 20 21 additionally, we begin the P2P process, planning to programming 22 process, for the 2027 through 2031 program. 23 To engage the public, we have implemented a comprehensive outreach strategy. This includes news releases, 24 25 targeted emails to nearly 13,000 GOVDelivery subscribers, social

media outreach, and promotional efforts on ADOT website. As you can see on the lower left-hand corner, as of April 11, we have received 600 comments through online survey, emails, and board meeting comments. In addition, the public is able to provide feedback through our -- through other channels, such as phone calls and letters.

The box on the right, that reflects the transportation modes on which the public commented. No surprise, highways continue to receive the bulk of comments, with 566 to date.

This slide shows the specific routes that have received at least 10 comments. So far the key themes from public inputs include the widening of 347 and widening and other improvements at several locations on I-10 in Maricopa and Pima County, widening of I-17 to three lanes from Phoenix to Flagstaff, and also several projects being requested on US-60. Additional comments were on Loop 303. Comments were made about the extension of the sound wall in the Pebble Creek area. On 260, SR-260, the comments pertain to the completion of the Knottingham Lane to connect the road to the Pinetop-Lakeside area. And finally, there are strong support for projects along US-93 corridor also observed.

Lastly, we have provided an Excel file to the Board containing all public comments. This slide includes a brief guide on how to navigate the file.

1 This concludes my presentation on the five-year 2 program. I'm happy to answer any question you may have. 3 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Any questions for Iqbal? 4 On the document you provided or the team provided 5 to the Board with all of the comments, there's a couple that I think might be miscategorized. So I can point them out to you 6 7 after, but I think it would be helpful. It just shows, like, they're in the wrong column, meaning it's indicating 202, but 8 9 it's really for 303, and a couple things like that. I think 10 it's probably, you know, how it all downloads, probably an error 11 like that, but I know that this is a public record, so I thought 12 we'd want to update that. And no surprise. I think, that 347 13 is winning. 14 MS. HOWARD: Madam Chair, is this the appropriate 15 time for me to make a couple of comments on that project? 16 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Please. 17 MS. HOWARD: I'm thinking with the agenda, this 18 is the most appropriate place to say that. 19 Just a reminder to the Board, and I hope I have 20 my numbers right. I think I do. Based on our workshop that we 21 had last week, just a reminder. According to the numbers I'm looking at, 2026, we are experiencing a 12 million -- just over 22 23 \$12 million shortfall. Only (inaudible) shortfall (inaudible) In 2027, we're up against \$134,000,932 shortfall before 24 347.

the 50 million contribution from the City of Maricopa.

25

That

leaves us a measly \$84,932,000. From what I understand, if -- and unfortunately, we're up against the clock with legislation as well with these two bills we're waiting to hear on, which take a huge chunk out of this project as well.

And I urge you and I challenge you, and I'm going to challenge myself, too, to look at this plan and see if we can come up with a way strategically and collectively to analyze other projects and come up with this money. And let's get it moved on this plan, if possible.

I'm hoping this legislation goes through, because that's a -- that's a huge deal. It sounds like from the City of Maricopa, we're pretty good. From the people there in Maricopa, they're ready to go as well. So I just urge you and I -- and I request you to do that, and hopefully at the next meeting, we can come back with a solution.

MR. SEARLE: Kind of on that note, Chair Daniels, and Board Member Howard, with the contribution that the City of Maricopa and the County of Pinal have come up with -- and I know it's not enough to do the whole project, but one of the concerns is if we wait is the timing of it, and I don't know why we can't look at phasing the project in.

And if we've got \$50 million sitting there that's available next year, and I understand now it's just for the widening, and it's not for the infrastructure that we kind of talked about that we supported in the work session, but I don't

know why we can't target a certain area of 347, whether it's on the Pinal County side of the Maricopa County side, and at least start widening it in phases, if nothing else. It at least starts the project and hopefully gives the community some semblance of hope that things are moving. And if we start at one spot, it might take five years to get the whole thing done, but at least it's a start.

And just the inflation factor alone, let's try to get as much as we can. And I think phasing might make a whole lot of sense, and if that is the case, I can't see a reason why we couldn't put a portion of the widening in this next fiscal year in the five-year plan. So yeah. That was my comment.

VICE CHAIR MAXWELL: Thank you, Madam Chair. I know the state engineers trying to address it, too. And I think the challenge for us is, remember, we do a five-year plan every year. So there's always things to do, and I can guarantee all the folks from Maricopa have done more than an adequate job of making their case.

And I do believe there's ways for us to get portions of this in, and I would not -- if we don't end up putting some of the widening or some of the other stuff where we still have to have the numbers figured out, I wouldn't take that as a loss, because it's an incremental step, or, if we're allowed to, when we come down to it, we can put it in there knowing the financing is not in place yet. It's all a matter

And when there is a response from a tribal department of transportation, is that given more weight as a tribal concern or project priority, rather than just given a point on the chart?

MR. BYRES: So the prioritization that is given in any one of the comments that goes through is it's all -- every single comment is weighted the same, but it is applied to whatever the comment goes towards. So if it's to a specific project, then obviously there's -- now there's public comment that comes in specific to that project, which gives it weight. So that's kind of how our comments work.

MS. PESHLAKAI: Thank you.

I'm just going to voice just some info, and it's a -- it's a problem that -- what I see as a problem that can't be really resolved right away or there's no quick fix, but there's a lot of folks here in Arizona that don't have access to the internet. Some of us don't even have electricity or running water, so that puts that whole population just being silenced by lack of infrastructure, and just like I said just now, I don't know how that would be -- could be fixed, but in a way, it can be possibly addressed by giving more weight.

I don't know if that's an unreasonable request, but somehow their -- the value of their comments or given some weight, if it's maybe a tribe. (Inaudible.) You understand what I'm saying. It's hard for me to explain, but I just really

wanted to say that, because those folks are disenfranchised and not really, truly represented just because they don't have equal access to people that are in these urban areas that, you know, their -- even their two-year-olds have a cell phone in their hand. So I just wanted to say that, Madam Chair. Thank you.

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Thank you, Board Member
Peshlakai, and I certainly can empathize with individuals who
don't have access. That's -- that was a -- has been a key
component, I think, of the public dialog around broadband, the
extent -- expansion of broadband and the ability to access
devices that would allow people to connect.

And I do want to just reiterate that perhaps this is where leadership really can come in, in that individuals who don't have access are still in communication with their elected leadership. We have lots of people that are elected in our tribal nations and serve on, you know, board of supervisors, council, the tribal councils, and also at the Legislature and in county supervisor positions. So I would love to see those individuals reach out to their community as well and sort of make a call to action to leadership to extend that voice.

I do believe and I firmly believe that every comment is equal in our state, meaning that regardless of where you live, we want to hear you, and we value your contribution.

And so I'm cognizant of that and would love to find additional channels for people's voices to be heard on the issues they care

1 about, on all issues, but transportation, obviously, is our 2 focus. MR. BYRES: Madam Chair, Board Member Peshlakai, 3 one of the ways that we kind of make sure that we're getting 4 some of that information in is ADOT has five tribal liaisons 5 that put more miles on vehicles than pretty much anybody else in 6 7 the state, and that's what they do. They travel around the 8 state to tribes on a regular basis, and one of the things that 9 they bring up is just this. It's a five-year program. It's 10 trying to get -- contribute any information that somebody has 11 that wants to contribute. It gives us another means of being 12 able to collect that data, so -- and we do that on a regular 13 basis. 14 MS. PESHLAKAI: Thank you. Madam Chairman, 15 (inaudible), thank you, and I'm becoming familiar with those 16 folks, and I appreciate their work and your work as well, and so 17 thank you. 18 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Board Member Elters, did you 19 have any comments on -- on the comments? Comments on the 20 comments that we've all received? 21 MR. BYRES: So Madam Chair, I was going to 22 address one of the comments from Board Member Howard. 23 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Please. 24 MR. BYRES: We do not have to have -- and it's 25 already been mentioned, but we do not have to have everything in

1 place when we take and approve the five-year -- the new five-2 year program. We're making changes every month. We make 3 incremental changes, but that doesn't mean that we can't make a 4 broader change if we see the need and the availability to do so. 5 So please don't think that you're constrained to just this, 6 because you're not. 7 VICE CHAIR MAXWELL: And Greg, so the point being 8 is we are fiscally constrained because of our own budget that 9 we've approved? 10 MR. BYRES: Correct. 11 VICE CHAIR MAXWELL: And a budget is a guess. 12 MR. BYRES: Correct. 13 VICE CHAIR MAXWELL: So -- and we're dealing with 14 that right now when we're talking Regional Transportation 15 Authority and Pima and how much we're going to go for to the 16 voters. It's a guess on what that half cent sales tax is going 17 to bring. So what we have to make sure is either we change the 18 number or we change the projects, and that's right now, because 19 we've established our bottom line. We have to move a project out before moving one in, unless we change the bottom line. 20 21 MR. BYRES: Correct. 22 VICE CHAIR MAXWELL: Thank you, sir. 23 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: All right. I think that 24 summarizes all the questions on 5A and 5B, and we'll move on to 25 Agenda Item 6, the AZ SMART program, and then we'll have Iqbal

What I would ask is 14 this is going to be a very important issue for ADOT, one 15 personally to keep -- because it's in -- a lot of it, the 16 problems are in -- within my district, to keep us (inaudible) I 17 think to keep all of our board members who this is going to 18 impact, roads, a potential future road in their district, 19 informed of the meetings, the outreach, when it's going to 20 happen, because those who are behind the lawsuit that led to 21 this will be there in force, I'm sure, but the question is, are 22 those who really support this project and participate in the 23 tier one, we want to make sure that they get the opportunity to 24 as well. 25 So this, to me, is a big item. I understand the

1 cost is kind of out of our control. It's a court order thing we 2 need to comply with, but I think it's important for ADOT to make 3 sure we message the opportunity for input into the subphase of 4 this tier one. 5 MR. HOSSAIN: Madam Chair, and the member --6 Board Member Maxwell, we'll make sure that we take proper action 7 to make sure to outreach to that. 8 VICE CHAIR MAXWELL: Thank you. Thank you, Madam 9 Chair. 10 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Additional item or on the 11 same one? 12 MR. ELTERS: The same one. 13 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Okay. Perfect. Go ahead. 14 MR. ELTERS: Thank you, Madam Chair. 15 I had a similar question. I would take it Yeah. 16 one step further. It would be really important and very 17 valuable to the Board to understand what it is that the 18 department is being asked to do. \$3 million is a large sum of 19 money. With that, I think it would be helpful to the Board and 20 to myself to understand what exactly was completed and what is 21 being requested going forward. Thank you. 22 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Perhaps we can make that a 23 future agenda item. I'm jumping to the end of our agenda, but 24 let's have an I-11 update. It is an important element. 25 could we request that to be presented to the Board?

And I also want to see the conversation with one additional item, and that is that the tier two dollars that have been identified and set aside by the Legislature a couple sessions ago for the I-11 tier two was for one segment of independent utility from the US-93 down to the I-10.

That is not the targeted element of the lawsuit, and so in having some additional conversations and going outside of the scope just a little bit, because I'm giving you background to provide for a future agenda item, but there has been precedents that -- in other states to have tier ones broken up into those independent segments of utility so that you could proceed with the tier two on a separate segment.

That question was asked of ADOT a few months ago, and we were told that that is not a possibility, but since that time, I've done some additional research and found that there is precedent for breaking up a tier one and proceeding with tier two. So I just want to flag that as also part of the dialog for a future agenda item.

VICE CHAIR MAXWELL: Madam Chair, can I add one comment? Because this has come up at the Legislature already. There are some legislators out there that are talking about doing it, and the question I've got for ADOT is if the judge makes a ruling on some (inaudible), is it -- should it be our responsibility to then question the judge to that specific question that Chair Daniels just mentioned, or do we really want

to rely on the Legislature to have to come in and get that solution? Because as we're seeing with some of the earlier legislative issues we've talked about, they're going to be very good at legislating what we can and can't do, but some of that times that is perhaps because of our lack of action.

And this is one that I really think would be good for, if possible, and if that -- probably have to go the director, if the director wants to, somebody needs to ask the judge to clarify this, because there is funding available to continue on a tier two for a segment of utility that has nothing to do with the part that was answered by the court case, but because the judge just said, I-11, everything needs to cease, that money's not being able to go forward, unless we're wrong and we've started the tier two on that segment, but I don't believe we have.

CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: So to make sure we don't go outside of our agenda, that's our request for future agenda items.

MR. ROEHRICH: Madam Chair, I've already made a note of that, and we will talk about the legal part, because I'm not -- I would agree with you. You can break up the tier one, except in this lawsuit they are joined together, and we have not been able to separate them. But the other part being is the Department of Justice is actually leading that effort for the federal government, because they're suing the (inaudible) city,

9	CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: We'll move to Agenda Item 8.
10	I'd Like to Greg to assist us.
11	MR. BYRES: Thank you very much, Madam Chair.
12	Board, Board Members.
13	For Item 8, we have 86 projects that are under
14	construction, worth \$2.9 billion. Five projects were finalized
15	in March, worth 32.1 million. Fiscal year to date, we have
16	65 million or 65 projects finalized.
17	So as far as what we've got going on across the
18	entire state this doesn't continue all the way across.
19	That's why this keeps falling off.
20	We've got we'll start off with the South
21	Central District. So we have SR-87 and Skousen Road. This
22	project is about 88 percent complete. They're currently working
23	under a stop work order for equipment that is currently on
24	order. They are finishing up some of the items that we they
25	can do. So they finishing up some pavement and so forth, but

it's basically going to be on hold until that equipment comes in to -- actually arrives on site.

Next project is the I-10 widening, Ina to Ruthrauff. That project is 81 percent complete. Most of the work that's being done today is on the Sunset Road overpass. Other than that, the road is pretty much complete. They've got all of the road onto the main line -- or all the traffic's on the main line, and once they can complete the ramps for Sunset, that will be ready to be opened. It's scheduled to be opened right now for the end of this year.

I-10 at Country Club to Kino, which is a design-build project, the final bid -- bids for -- from the developers are due in June. Once that gets -- once we receive those, then we can start that project and get it kicked off. We're looking at the second notice to proceed to be in June of this year.

The next one we have is I-19 to Irvington TI.

That project is working on environmental and right-of-way
clearances and is anticipated for -- to go out for bid -- let's
see here -- spring of '26. That's what we've got.

And then we also have SR-90, which is the Border Patrol Station to Moson Road, right down the street here not too far. That project's currently at 55 percent. The contractor has two crews running on that project, trying to get it completed as quick as they can. Right now we're looking at the end of this project being completed the end of summer of this

1 year. 2 MR. SEARLE: (Inaudible.) Greg? MR. BYRES: Yes. 3 4 MR. SEARLE: I know it's on your report, but I'd 5 just like to comment (inaudible) brought up earlier that 6 (inaudible) passing lane on 10 (inaudible) coming out of Benson 7 is just about finished. 8 MR. BYRES: Yep. 9 MR. SEARLE: And it's been long needed. 10 But I do have a question, a follow-up, if you 11 could get with Jeremy for me, and that's on Highway 80, that 12 St. David bridge, it's still not 100 percent -- it's not fully 13 completed, and I would like to know when the final completion 14 for the overlay is expected. 15 MR. BYRES: I can find out for you. 16 MR. SEARLE: All right. Thank you. 17 MR. BYRES: Thank you. 18 So the next one we have is North Central 19 District. The first project we have is the Townsend Winona to 20 Sunset Crater Point, drainage repairs. That's on US-89. That 21 project is -- should be running through fall of this year to be 22 completed. The next one we have is on I-40. That's the 23 24 broadband that we've got going from the California state line 25 all the way to basically Flagstaff. Right now that project is

about 20 percent complete. We're -- they're swapping gears and jumping from that most western side to Flagstaff area on I-40 to get that broadband put in. Because we have two upcoming projects on I-40, we need to get that in so that it is done before those two projects kick off.

The next one we have is the roundabout for the City of Flagstaff. That is currently about 6 percent complete, and we're looking at having that done by fall of this year.

The next item we have is Southwest District. So for it, we've got the I-10 Salome Road to Tonopah. Right now, that project is at about 10 percent complete, and we're looking at about a completion date -- I thought I had a completion date on here. It's estimated for October this year.

The next one is SR-95, Tyson Street to

Quartzsite. It's a pavement preservation project. It's about

34 percent complete. We're looking at it being completed in

September of '25.

And then the last one is the -- or not the last one, but the port of entry is going on right now. It's about, let's see here, 60 percent complete, and we're continuing with it. There's -- estimated completion is June of '25.

And then the last one is SR-85, I-8 drainage improvements. There's a box culvert that we're trying to take care of on that. And right now, it's at about 55 percent complete, and it should be completed by June.

The next one we have is the Southeast District, which is -- the first one we have is US-91, the 7th Street to Milepost 173. We've got paving work going on on it. It should start probably this week. It may have already started this week or next week, and will be ongoing.

The next project we have is Medicine Way Road to Milepost 275 on US-70. That project is currently under design. We're anticipating having it advertised June 20 of this year.

And then the last one we have is East Willcox TI.

For that one, it's about 67 percent complete, and we're looking at having it completed about February, the beginning of February.

The next one is Northwest District. For it, we've got the Rancho Santa Fe Parkway that we're working on.

That project is about 14 percent complete. Right now they're working on some of the ramps, doing earthwork, as well as some water line installation.

The next one is I-40. That's from the California border to Needle Mountain. That project is a pavement preservation project, and they're currently working on the paving as well as some barrier work. They're about 42 percent complete on that project.

And then US-93, Cane Springs, that project, it's an expansion project, and we're looking at it being 12 percent complete. They're just basically kicking that project off.

The next one is Northeast District. We've got the US-160 from 416 to 440, going on with it. Pavement rehab project that just started here, as a matter of fact, within the last couple of weeks.

The next project we have is I-40. This is 8th Avenue in Holbrook. Let's see here. For it, we're looking at -- that's -- it's a deck repair project and some milling for the deck itself. Right now we're looking at just -- it's just starting up. They're going to have to replace some sleeper slabs on that project to get it going before they do the deck work.

And then the last one we have is SR-73 at the 260 junction. This is installation of sidewalks and some lighting for that. They're just working on the curb and gutter as we speak today.

The next one is Central District. For it, we've got the SR-101 Princess to Shea. That project is about 67 percent complete. They're actually doing pretty good on it.

We also have the SR-101, the I-17 to 75th Avenue, which is about 22 percent complete. That project is on schedule and going very well. We have the 303 and US-60. That's the interim work that we're doing for the interchange. That project is about 75 percent complete, and they're actually doing pretty well on that one as well.

We have the US-60, Sossaman to Meridian. That

1 project is almost 50 percent complete. It's actually doing well 2 trying to maintain the traffic on it as we're going through construction on that. It's a little bit difficult, but they're 3 4 getting it done. 5 The SR-202 Val Vista to SR-101, this is an 6 expansion project. They're adding a lane in each direction. 7 It's 28 percent complete, and they're actually doing pretty good 8 on it as well. 9 The last one we have is the I-10 Gila River 10 Bridge, which the -- what will be the eastbound bridge is now 11 carrying the westbound traffic on the new bridge. We demoed the 12 old bridge. So both the old bridges are now -- one of the old 13 bridges is gone. We've got traffic halfway on each one. So 14 they'll keep on going with it. So it -- the project is, for 15 best bet, halfway done at this point, so... 16 And that's pretty much what I had for what's 17 going on across the state. 18 CHAIRWOMAN DANIELS: Any questions for Greg? You 19 guys aren't busy at all. All lot going on. 20 Okay. We can move to Agenda Item 9, and in the 21 interest of efficiency, are there any of these 9A to 9D that any 22 of the Board would like additional information on? 23 MR.
